### GARDINER FOR NEW RULES

Massachusetts Representative Opposes Caucus on Them.

### SAYS SPEAKER NOT AT FAULT

Believes Way to Prevent Control of Men from Manipulating is Not to Hold the Usual Party Conference.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Representative Gardiner of Massachusetts, was a caller on the president today and as he was departing from the White house gave out the following statement of his stand on the speaker's situation.

"I shall not decide how to vote on the speaker's situation until I know the names of the candidates. Personally, I am more interested in a change in the rules than in the change in the speaker. If we members of the house continue to adopt rules abandoning our power and shifting our responsibilities onto the speaker's shoulders we must not go back to our constituents and cry baby because he exercises that power, while we cheerfully leave him to bear all the responsibility. Therefore the rules have been prescribed by the majority in the party caucus; in other words, by majority of the house and the motive power has been supplied by a still smaller sub-division of the house. The time has now come when those of us who are dissatisfied must do one of three things: either carry the party caucus, refuse to caucus on rules, or shut up. I believe that our best chance lies in the second line of procedure."
