



The largest and most wonderful building the world is the terminal building of Grace Baptist, Tenth and Arbor, B. F. the Hudson & Manhattan Railway company Feliman, Pastor—"The Reign of the Holy in New York. It is twenty-iwo stories high, Spirit," at 16:45 a. m. Young people's meetthe Hudson & Manhattan Railway company occupies the halves of two blocks fronting on Church street, which is parallel with Broadway and the next street toward the river and extends from Cortlandt to Fulton street on both sides of Dey street, which is crossed by a bridge. It covers 75,000 square feet on the ground and includes 18,159,000 square feet of floor space, equivalent to twenty-seven acres.

The gigantic structure stands over cofferdam, a waterproof plf 420 by 180 feet in size and seventy-five feet deep, inclosed in concrete walls seventy-five feet thick, which extend down to solid rock ninetyfive feet below the street level.
