### MODEL A—TOURING CAR DESCRIPTION OF MECHANISM OF THE VELIE AUTOMOBILE:

**MOTOR.** 30 H. P., 4-cylinder engine, cast in pairs, water cooled; centrifugal circulating pump.

**TEST OF MOTOR.** Each motor is tested for 3 hours under load by hydraulic dynamometer. There will be no question about the power.

**CAM SHAFT.** Machine steel mounted on 3 imported Hess Bright Ball Bearings. Pump shaft mounted on imported Hess Bright Ball Bearings. Idler gear on 2 imported Hess Bright Ball Bearings.

**FRAME.** Pressed steel; 2 1/4 inch drop to permit of as nearly as possible horizontal shaft drive.

**CRANK CASE.** Highest grade of Aluminum Alloy.

**WATER PUMP.** Centrifugal gear driven.

**FAN.** Aluminum, mounted on ball bearings.

**CARBURETER.** Schebler.

**TIMER.** LaCote type, ball bearing, special design.

The market throughout the week has been in a healthy condition. Packers have evidently wanted the few desirable beef steers coming and they have bought the arrivals very readily. Prices have been steadily advancing and at the close of the week beef steers are safely 25 to 60 cents higher than they were a week ago.

Cows and heifers have also shown good advances from day to day, being active sellers in the face of moderate receipts of the week are 25 to 60 cents higher, and the advance has been practically held over the week. As a matter of course, the best grades usually get the best of any improvement of the market.

The feeders coming have sold very freely at good prices. They were already very high to begin with, and hence there was not room for very much advance, but still they are safely 10 to 15 cents higher, and some being quite noticeable on the medium grades and all good light stockers.

**WEATHER IN THE GRAIN BELT**

**FAIR AND COLDER FOR SUNDAY IS FORECAST.**

**OMAHA, Dec. 26, 1908.**

A barometric depression, noted over the extreme upper valleys and upper lake region Thursday morning, is moving off the upper Atlantic coast this morning. This disturbance is causing generally cloudy weather throughout the eastern portion and light snows are falling in the lower lake region and south over western New York, western Pennsylvania, Virginia and North Carolina. A depression is being produced over the extreme upper valleys and Canadian provinces, with its center over Manitoba. This depression has caused a very rapid and decided rise in temperature in the upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, and has followed by the northwest. The pressure is high over the Pacific coast and southeast over the lower mountain belt, and is high over the extreme lower valleys and southern states. The depression over the upper valleys and the western high causing colder in this vicinity tonight and Sunday, with continued fair weather.
