

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
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Why Chicks Fall to hatch the shell of an egg is composed of part mineral and part animal matter. Soak an egg for a couple of days in strong vinegar, to remove the lime or mineral matter, and you will be surprised at the pliable but tough and leathery coat remaining. Put this for M days in air carrying 20 per cent meisture and it becomes so tough that no chick could break through. In strof proper heat and moisture this animal matter rots instead of becoming tough, just as a piece of meat will rot in moist air, though becoming dry, tough and leathery in dry air. With a tender, rotten shell the chick easily emerges at hatching time. Heat, Molsture, and Ventilation, must all be regulated if conditions are to be always right at the eggs. The Mandy Lee is the only inculator in the world in which every feature is measured and regulated.

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N INCUBATOR that does not make occasional big hatches is a poor one indeed. All that is needed is correct conditions of Heart.
