Waiver to Be Asked for Minor

Monday at the meeting of the commission in this city. "In the future no walvers shall be asked by any major league club for purchased minor league players previous to December 1 following such purchase, except where the player purchased is for immediate use and joins the purchasing club and has been under contract for at least ten days and participated in at least one game with such

club. When a major league club asks for a waiver to a purchased minor league player the president of the league containing such club shall immediately notify by wire the president of the opposite league thereof and the president of the opposite league shall be requird within three days either to waive claim to such player or negotiate for his services with the particular club in his league desiring the same; the claim, however, of any club in the league seeking the waiver to have precedence over the claim of any club in the opposite league."
