LIMIT ON PRISON SENTENCES

Judge Thornell Takes Radical Ground on Subject. Judge A. B. Thornell of Sidney, who is presiding over the present term of district court in this city, yesterday expressed himself as opposed to prisoners being sentenced to definite terms in the penitentiary.

"I believe all sentences for criminal offenses should be made absolutely indeterminate. The convicted criminal should be sent to the penitentiary or reformatory to remain there until the judgment of the board of parole is reached.

"Our present system does not really prove an indeterminate sentence because sentences are now administered terminate in a stated period. The present system is a failure.

TAFT CABINET FINISHED

Early Departure of Mr. Knox Indicates that State Has Been Completed.

AGUSTA, Ga., Jan. 9.—The Taft-Knox cabinet conference is over and the Pennsylvania senator is on his way back to Washington. Under the President's plan his adviser will discuss the result and it is strongly hinted by Mr. Taft tonight that his cabinet will be made known for the first time when he sends the names of the men who are to compose it to the senate for confirmation after the fourth of March.

With the early ending of the conference with Mr. Knox it seems a reasonable conclusion that the Taft cabinet is decided. The president today added Columbus, S. C., to the list of southern cities he will visit at the first opportunity after he becomes president.
