ditions. The War department authorities are considering the question of further contracts for additional articles for the heavy furiture to be installed in the quarters of officers at all army posts. There is available for this purpose during the present fiscal year the sum of \$300,000, and it will not be known how far this fund will enable the quartermaster general to acquire the furniture to complete the list of articles ntil blds are opened. It is proposed to purchase bookcases, chests of drawers, parfor tables, hatracks and easy chairs. The War department is receiving petitions from army officers in regard to the bill (S. 2671) providing for 612 extra officers of the army. It has been requested in these petitions that the bill be amended so as to insert that the vacancies created by it shall at all times be apportioned to each arm and corps and to each grade thereto, as near as may be, in the exact proportion that the numbers in these grades bear to the numbers in the corresponding grade of the several arms and corps affected by the bill. The War department authorities are not inclined to approve petitions of this sort, largely for the reason that it takes from the War department administrative discretion which it is deemed desirable should be entrusted to the departmental functions. The original proposition is to leave this matter to the department with the assurance that everything will be done with fairness to the various branches and grades.
