

BANKS RE-ELECT OFFICERS

Few Changes Are Made in Staffs or Directorships.

G. C. BARTON RETIRES ENTIRELY

Succeeded as Director of United States National by W. E. Rhodes

Few changes were made in the boards of directors of the national banks of Omaha at the annual meetings of the stockholders Tuesday.

Because of poor health Guy C. Barton retired from the board of directors of the United States National and W. H. Rhodes is elected in his place.

The First National elected its old officers and directors, the officers being C. T. Kountze, president; F. H. Davis, vice president; L. L. Kountze, second vice president; T. L. Davis, cashier, and I. Allison, assistant cashier.

The Omaha National had no changes, the officers being J. H. Millard, president; William Wallace, vice president; C. F. McGrew, vice president; W. H. Bucholz, cashier; Frank Boyd, B. A. Wilcox and Clara Millard, assistant cashiers.

The United States National elected W. E. Rhodes a director in place of Guy C. Barton. The officers are: Milton T. Barlow, president; G. W. Wattles, vice president; V. B. Caldwell, vice president; A. Millard, vice president; W. E. Rhodes, cashier; G. E. Haverstick, assistant cashier, and R. P. Morsman, assistant cashier.

The Nebraska National held its meeting at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and re-elected Henry W. Yates, president; Warren Switeler vice president, W. E. Shepard cashier and Henry W. Yates, Jr., assistant cashier.

The officers and directors of J. L. Brandeis & Sons bank were re-elected. They are Arthur D. Brandeis, president; John L. Kennedy, vice president; H. H. Brandeis, cashier and Emil Brandeis secretary.

NEW HOTEL FOR SOUTH OMAHA

Large Building to Be Joined to Miller and Operated by Otto Siemssen.

A new and large hotel building is going up in South Omaha at the corner of Twenty-sixth and O streets. E. W. Gunther being the capitalist involved and Bach & McDonald the contractors.

The new building is a two-story brick 62x80 and will stand adjacent to the Miller hotel. When completed the upper floor of the new building will be joined for hotel purposes to the Miller, making a single building 16x120, for the dimensions of the Miller building are 8x60.

The new building will cost \$150,000 when completed, and this will be about May 1. Otto Siemssen of Omaha will take it over and has charge of the building, while E. L. Miller will operate the hotel. There will be four new stores under the hotel part of the new structure.
