SHARKSHAUNT FEETLESS MAN

Loan Agents Pursue Victim Who Has Lost Both Legs.

THREATEN NOW TO TAKE HIS JOB

Point of William Clair Gives Grim Hint and Emphasis to Governor's Appeal for Law Against Sharks.

The trifling consideration that a man has had both feet cut off makes no difference to the loan shark.

This is one fact in the case of William Clair, whose debt-bound plight gives grim point and emphasis to the recommendation by Governor Sheldon in his last message that something be done in the matter of the loan sharks.

Clair is a man of 50 years, who for the first part of his life had at least one foot, the other being amputated when he was a child.

Clair had some furniture at one time which he was buying on the installment plan; his creditors had him fast, however, and this went back to the furniture people, with all that had been paid on it a clean loss.

After a time this doubly crippled man fell ill again. He had to go to the hospital and have another amputation performed. This time he lost the knee joint of the leg which had been blood poisoned before.

While Clair lay on the operating table his creditors sought out his son and persuaded him to assume part of his father's indebtedness.

Clair went back to work. He left the hospital to save and skimp every cent as he had been doing for the last two years.

A few days ago he had his indebtedness reduced to five. The loan sharks demanded money.

"You settle in full or we shall file a salary judgment," was the answer.

Clair now fears he will lose his job with Swift and Company, because of the filing of the assignment which Clair had to sign when he took his first note.

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JUDGE ANDERSON TO PRESIDE

Indianapolis Jurist to Hear Retrial of Standard Oil Heir

CHICAGO, Jan. 13.—Judge Albert H. Anderson of Indianapolis will preside at the retrial of the case against the Standard Oil company, in which Judge J. M. Landis imposed a fine of \$15,000.

This was definitely fixed today when Judge Landis to whom the case was remanded by the circuit court of appeals, received a letter from Judge Anderson accepting the assignment of the case.

Acting under the arrangement, Judge Landis ordered the district court clerk to send notice to all the attorneys in the case.

"I would not venture to anticipate what date will be decided upon for the beginning of the trial," said Judge Landis; "it will depend largely upon Judge Anderson's convenience."

Both sides announced their readiness to begin work as soon as possible. It is the belief of the attorneys that the retrial will not require as much time as was taken up in the original hearing.
