REENER CONFESSES MURDER

Pennsylvania Farmer Admits Truth of Story Told by Housekeeper,

CUT UP BODY AND BURIED IT

Finding of Ashes and Burned Bones Corroborates Statement Made to Police-Married Again Since Murder.

YORK, Pa. Jan. 11-Harry Keener, a York county farmer, confessed today that the story told by Miss Lorenza Tawser, his former housekeeper, that he had killed a man on his farm last July is true. The identity of the victim is still unknown, The girl, who is but 18 years of age, ac cused Keener while she was lying on what

was believed to be her deathbed. Investigation corroborated all the girl's statements except the burial of the body. While the entire orchard was being plowed yesterday Keener was constantly "aweated" by the police. Early today, unable to hold out any longer, Keener admitted the crime and corroborated practically all of the details of the revelation made by Miss, Tawser. Keener said his victim was a stranger who came to his house to the night and without apparent provocation threatened to kill him. He said he shot through the glass in the door of his home and killed him. He then buried the body in the orchard, but the odor caused him to take it up. He tried to dispose of it by burning, but in this he was unsuccessful. Keener says Miss Tawser helped to cut up the body and assisted in its burial. He said the arms and legs were separated from the trunk and were buried at different points. A portion of the body was buried in the cellar of the home, other parts were buried on the farm of his father, some miles away.
