A valuable suggestion was given by s dealer concerning the keeping of brass bedsteads and all brass fixtures in as beautiful condition as it is when new. It is a trade secret and is used by all who deal in brass fittings. Nearly all brass work when sent out is lacquered to prevent corrosion and to avoid the labor of frequent polishing. This lacquer is gum shellac dissolved in alcohol. This makes a thin varnish, which is applied with a smail brush. Ten cents worth of shellac made thin with the alcohol will lacquer your bed, and an ordinary workman can do the work in an hour, and your bed will look as good as it would if sent to the factory, which would cost several dollars.




