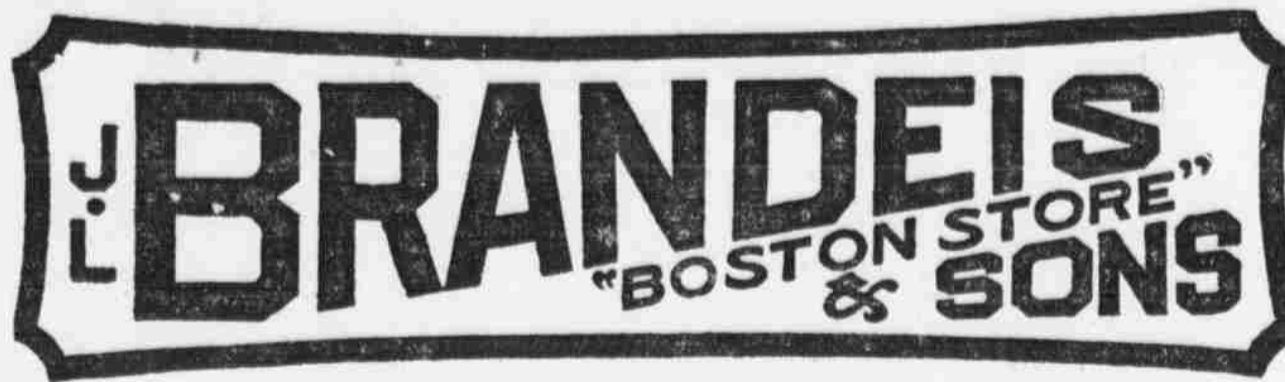

HAT FACTORIES ARE TIED UP

Union Officials Say Fifteen Thousand Workers Are Out.

HUNDRED PLANTS ARE AFFECTED

Hatters Will Appeal Direct to the American Federation of Labor, Which is Custodian of Funds.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—Important developments in the strike of the hatters in the shops of the Associated Hat Manufacturers are expected today as the result of a gathering of the strikers' leaders in this city. President Morfit and the members of the national board of the United Hatters of North America were to confer and receive reports from the various branches of the union involved in the strike. It was stated by Secretary Martin Lawler of the United Hatters, that the tie-up in the plants of the Associated Hat Manufacturers was complete. Fifteen thousand men in 150 factories all over the country had gone out, he said, and would stay out until the difficulty with their employers was adjusted.

The strike so far has been a peaceful one, no disorders being reported anywhere.

According to the officials of the hatters, because the federation is now custodian of the hatters' funds, which amount to between \$20,000 and \$40,000.

NEW STATES MUST WAIT

Mexico and Arizona Bills Probably Will Be Sidetracked by Senate Leaders.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Numerous delegations from New Mexico and Arizona, which have come here to press the claims of those territories for statehood, have learned that the senate leaders do not intend to permit the statehood bill to pass at the present session. This decision has been reached at an informal conference of senate leaders. It was said that there is not enough time remaining of this congress to enact the necessary legislation. Statehood measures invariably provoke prolonged discussion.

LABOR LEADERS RAP KEEFE

Object to His Confirmation as Immigration Commissioner—Gore Takes Up Fight.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Considerable opposition to the confirmation of Daniel J. Keefe of Michigan, who was nominated by the president on December 1 to succeed the late Frank Sargent as commissioner general of immigration, has developed in the senate under the leadership of Mr. Gore of Oklahoma. The objection to confirmation advanced by Mr. Gore is the fact that a report has been made to him by certain labor leaders that Mr. Keefe received the appointment as a reward for breaking with President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor during the recent presidential campaign.

UNCLE SAM'S STILL HUNTERS

Nerve Center of Secret Service Work in Washington.

NATION-WIDE RANGE OF ACTION

Notable Men in the Service—How the Membership is Recruited—Monetary Rewards Only Moderate.

The United States secret service, which is receiving a good deal of attention these days in congress and in the newspapers, is frequently called the "least known branch of our government." Its operations are at present restricted pretty closely to apprehending counterfeiters and the protection of the person of the chief magistrate. Until a somewhat recent date, however, secret service operatives were assigned to other duties, such as obtaining evidence in land fraud cases, exposing the "cotton report leak" in the Department of Agriculture and in investigating charges against naval officers.

It is this field service which makes it necessary for every secret service man to abandon all thought of fixed habitation, with social and family ties. He may be ordered from New York to Texas or from the mountains of Tennessee to San Francisco at an hour's notice, and it is impossible to predict in advance how long he will remain at any given place. True to its name and policy, the secret service aims to let the public know just as little as possible regarding its personnel. No operative allows his photograph to be made, much less published, if he can help it, and he seldom acknowledges his identity. At headquarters there is a rule

against disclosing the name or address of any of the operatives.

A new recruit in the service starts out as an assistant operative at \$3 a day, and, if he proves worthy, is promoted in due course to the rank of operative, at \$5 a day. His pay may then increase to \$7 a day, but he whose salary reaches this point, just short of \$6 a week, must have proved his worth by long service.

MONETARY REWARDS.

For all that the monetary rewards of a secret service career are by no means excessive, there is never any dearth of applicants for the limited number of places in this confidential corps. Following any occasion when the secret service is brought conspicuously to the attention of the public, Chief Wilkie receives applications by the score from young men in all parts of the country who are ambitious to shine as government sleuths. A majority of the aspirants naively confess that they have had no experience whatever which would help them for this highly specialized field. Seven hundred names are now on the "waiting list" of eligibles.

Some of the most capable operatives now on Uncle Sam's payroll have come from the claim departments of the great railroads. Others have gained their training with mercantile agencies, and still others have come from law offices, where certain classes of detective work are frequently necessary. Two of the best men on the force were formerly heads of municipal police departments. Others served in legitimate private detective organizations or independent police departments maintained by the great railway systems. A certain proportion have had the benefit of preliminary service as United States deputy marshals, and not a few have come to the secret service from the departments of public safety in foreign countries. These latter, by reason

of their knowledge of foreign tongues and mannerisms, are valuable.

LUZON TROOPS TAKE PRIZE

Division Meets, Army of the Philippines, Comes to Close at Manila.

MANTILA, Jan. 15.—The division which came to an end this afternoon, was the largest and most successful ever by the army in the Philippines. The closing of the army was a review of 1,500 troops by Brigadier General Tasker J. Bliss and the distribution of prizes of Pansay field. The Department of Luzon captured a first place and the Department of Mindanao was second. Troop L of the First cavalry won the cavalry cup, and Company F of the Thirtieth infantry carried away the infantry cup.

KERN WILL NOT TALK NOW

Defeated Candidate Will Not Follow Up Charges of Unfair Treatment.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 15.—Joe Kern refused today to make any further statement concerning the democratic senatorial caucus which resulted in his defeat. It had been expected he would follow his charges of unfair treatment, on Thursday evening, by more specific accusations. He said today he would issue a statement now and perhaps not at all.
