

HILL OFFICIALS GO WEST

Executive Heads of Burlington Will Go Over New Line.

DENVER YARN CAUSES LAUGH

Amused at Ambitions of Real Estate Exchange in Talking of Moving Omaha Headquarters to Colorado.

G. B. Harris, president; D. Willard, vice president in charge of operation, and Darius Miller, in charge of traffic of the Burlington, will arrive in Omaha this afternoon and in company with G. W. Holdrege, general manager, will proceed to Denver, to go over the newly acquired Colorado & Southern road.

The Burlington lines west of the river, under the control of Mr. Holdrege, comprise 4,735 miles of road. The mileage of the Colorado & Southern is 1,234 miles. The mileage of the roads controlled by the Colorado & Southern is: Fort Worth & Denver City, 454 miles; Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek District, 74 miles; Trinity & Brazos Valley, 286 miles, and Wichita Valley, 475 miles.

The Associated Press carried the following story from Denver: DENVER, Colo., Jan. 21.—The securing for Denver of the western office of the Burlington railroad, now located at Omaha, is the objective of a vigorous movement maintained yesterday by the Denver Real Estate exchange. It is expected that all the commercial bodies of Denver will join the movement.

Local officials simply laugh at the idea of Mr. Hill moving his headquarters of the Burlington to Denver when Omaha is so much more centrally located. Rates Despite the Decision. The granting of special rates for the lumbermen's convention at Kansas City for next week has caused several reductions in rates to be announced by the western roads in spite of the decision of the traffic officials to give no further reduced rates during 1909.

The Burlington has announced that it will make a reduced round-trip rate from Denver to Chicago and return of \$22.75 from January 22 to 28, and during the same dates a reduced rate from Chicago to Denver and return of \$27.50 has been made. The Union Pacific announced a reduced rate from Denver and Nebraska points to Kansas City and other points. It has gone further and made the reduced rate apply to Chicago.

W. P. A. Meeting at Chicago. Many of the Omaha representatives of the traffic departments of the Omaha regular quarterly meeting of the Western Passenger association, E. L. Lomax, general passenger agent; W. H. Murray, assistant general passenger agent and Warren Cundiff, chief rate clerk, will represent the Union Pacific.

A. L. Mohler, general manager of the Union Pacific has gone to Chicago. Neil Mooney, general western passenger agent of the West Shore at Chicago, was in Omaha Thursday. The Union Pacific is using some of the Cananea, Rio Yaqui Pacific engines on the Overland trains. These engines were built for Harriman's Mexican roads, but the Union Pacific, becoming short of locomotives, pressed them into service.

Line Ralston to Papillion. Grade stakes are being placed by the Nebraska Traction and Power company for a new line from Ralston to Papillion. The line is to be built as soon as the one from the city limits of Ralston to Omaha and West Q streets to Ralston is completed. Ties and rails for the South Omaha line have been scattered along the right-of-way and the promoters say the rails will be laid as soon as work can open up in the spring. The line will start from the west end of the West Q street viaduct and run to Ralston.


