

WEARY WILLIES ON THE MOVE Tramps Estimated to Cost the Railroads Twenty-Five Million

When "Weary Willie" travels along the dusty road or appears in the illustrated weeklies he does not look like a serious problem. But when it is stated by a prominent railway officer that vagrants cost the American railways at least \$25,-000,000 a year because of their depredations, the matter looks more serious. A New York charity organization officer has recently received from a half hundred railroads in the United States the latest word

regarding vagrancy on their lines. W. H. Canniff, president of the New York, Chicago & St. Louis railroad, states that on one occasion during June, 102 men were ejected from one of the freight trains of the company in a journey of 132 miles. J. E. Childs, general manager of the New York, Ontario & Western, says that there are probably 50 per cent more vagrants passing over the line than a year ago, Typical depradations of these vagrants are hold-ups and breaking into cars and stations. The Norfolk & Western reports, through its president, that the increase in vagrancy over a year ago is 25 per cent, a fact particularly noticeable in the increased robbery of cars. "We have had,"
