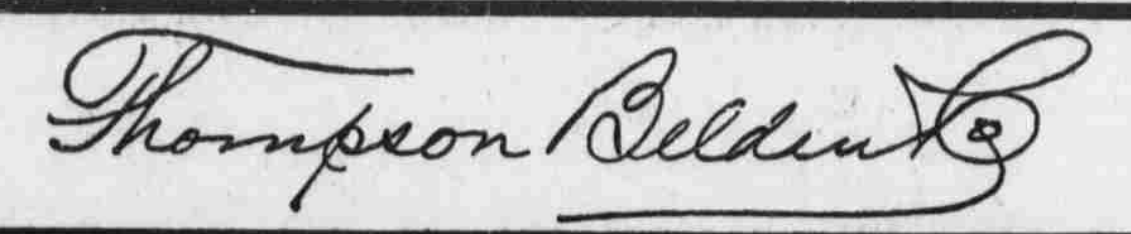

CAR HURLED DOWN RAVINE

Thirty-Seven Passengers Imperiled in Accident Due to Storm.

ONLY TWO FATALLY INJURED

Motorman Loses Control of Car, Which Plunges Over Steep Embankment—Score or More Are Hurt.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 30.—The snowstorm and consequent slippery tracks is given as the cause of an accident here today that may cost two lives, while several other persons were injured.

A college Hill main line car with thirty-seven passengers jumped the rails on Clifton avenue and tumbled down a steep embankment, landing at the bottom of a ravine with a mass of shrieking, fighting men, women and children caught under it.

GARFIELD NOT IN THE CABINET

Present Secretary of Interior Will Not Be a Member of Taft's Official Family.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The definite statement can be made that James R. Garfield, secretary of the interior, will not be a member of the cabinet of the next administration. Neither will he be an ambassador to a foreign country. He will return to his home in Ohio and take up the practice of law.

There is almost as good authority for saying that there will be a clean sweep of the present cabinet members unless it should be Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, Postmaster General Meyer. There is much doubt as to Mr. Wilson. Mr. Garfield admitted today that he would not be in the next cabinet.

BULGARIA WILL STAND PAT

Will Assume Uncompromising Attitude as to Amount to Be Paid Turkey.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 30.—According to advices received here the Bulgarian government has adopted an uncompromising attitude on the question of amount of indemnity to be paid Turkey as a result of the Bulgarian declaration of independence last October. There can be no increase, it is declared, over the present offer of \$6,400,000 and it is further intimated that should a settlement on that basis be delayed much longer Bulgaria will reconsider its position.
