TWO-CENT FARE FIGHT IS OLD Same Conflict in Other States as is Now On in South Dakota. "The conflict between the state supreme court and the federal court in South Dakota

over the recently enacted 2-cent fare law is not new in judicial circles," says A. S. Churchill, formerly attorney general of Nebraska. Mr. Churchill says there has been the same conflict in other states and that the United States supreme court has held that the state court and not the federal bench in the state, has jurisdiction, especially

inasmuch as the state supreme court secured action first. The Dakota legislature Wednesday passed a 2-cent fare bill with an emergency clause attached. The governor signed it immediately which put the measure into injunction from the state supreme court restraining the railroads from selling tickets for more than 2 cents, while the railroads secured an injunction in the federal court restraining the state officers

from putting the law into effect. "Two cents a mile is all that can be charged for railway travel until the temporary injunction in the state supreme court is dissolved," said Mr. Churchill. "The case is somewhat parallel with that of Nebraska a few years ago and I believe the state has the best end of the argument in South Dakota.
