

TWENTY-TWO YEARS IN OMAHA

Hayden Bros. Will Celebrate Twenty-Second Anniversary Wednesday.

From Small Beginning Omaha Firm Has Spread Out Until it is Recognized as One of the Lenders in the West.

Two years ago Hayden Bros, built the large building, practically seven stories high, facing on Douglas street between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, and this was joined to all the other buildings by a subway under the alley, making all these buildings into one huge retail store.
