BILL DEFINING SUFFRAGE RIGHTS

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Feb. 14.-(Special.)-A short session of the house of the lows legislature was hold Saturday, but because of a small attendance there was no rull call. In the meantime the contest committees were at work upon two of the contests. 
