The citizens of each of the high contracting parties shall have liberty to travel in the states and territories of the other, to carry on trade, wholesale and retail, to hire and occupy houses and warehouses, to employ agents of their choice, and generally to do snything incident to or necessary for trade upon the same terms as the natives of the country, submitting themselves to the laws there established.
