Strong Rally Which Starts Wednesday Ends Abruptly. DEMORALIZED BREAK IN PRICES. Values in Some Cases Drop Below the Low Point of Tuesday—The Bond Market Is Irregular.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—There was a sharp ending today of the strong rally which started Wednesday and continued through Tuesday. The reaction reached a violence in some quarters that paralyzed the demoralized breaks Tuesday and in the stocks market, carried them to lower prices than were touched on the previous week.

The special point of weakness in today's market was the copper group of industrials. The sagging and lack of confirmation of their decline pointed to a professional bear attack, bringing down the copper market to a point lower than it had reached in several months.

BERRYMAN OUT FOR MAYOR

Jack Leader Files and Will Fight Dahlgren for Nomination. WILL SOON ANNOUNCE PLATFORM. Proposes to Make His Campaign as Democratic and Not Jacksonian—Loback Steps Out of the Race.

Ed P. Berryman, president of the Board of Park Commissioners, announced today that he would support for mayor of Omaha, against Mayor Dahlgren, who filed three weeks ago for re-nomination on the same ticket.

The new candidate is secretary of the Jacksonian club of Nebraska, but he announces that he will not make a campaign as a Jack, but as a plain, every-day citizen, asking for support from Jacks and Jims alike.

"I do not know as there is anything special to say about my candidacy," said Berryman, "except that I intend to make a clean, straight and forceful campaign. I have missed but few sessions of the council during the last three years and believe that the present council should be re-elected and that Omaha should have a mayor in full sympathy with the council."

Colonel Berryman was appointed a member of the Board of Park Commissioners by Mayor Dahlgren, but he says he has no intention of resigning this position. He emphasizes that he is under no obligations to the mayor by retaining the position to which the executive appointment was made.

John R. Heigren, accountant in the office of county controller, filed Wednesday noon as a candidate for city controller, but during the afternoon he withdrew the filing at the request of City Clerk Butler, who explained that it was accepted by the deputy auditor.
