JAMIESON QUILTS SENATE

Changes Mind About Assuming Congressional Duties at Once.

DEMOCRATS UNABLE TO AGREE

Bill to Draw the Line Closer on Sales of Liquor by Druggists—Rotation of Names on Primary Ballot.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

DES MOINES, March 4.—(Special.)—Senator W. D. Jamieson of Papp county resigned as state senator today. Up to a few days ago he was of a mind not to resign, but to remain here until near the close of the month and then go to Washington to take his seat in congress.

He was asked to resign and the matter of having a special election called to fill the vacancy was canvassed and it was the general opinion of leaders of both parties that even if Jamieson should resign now it would not be justifiable to have a special election, for his successor would take his seat until about ten days before the next session.

The senators, in view of the resignation of Jamieson, permitted him to call up and have passed his bill to permit the railroad commission to authorize railroads to make the short haul rate at competing points. It was passed 27 to 12.

Caucus Unsuccessful.

The house democrats held a caucus at noon to consider what should be their attitude toward the prohibitory amendment to the constitution. It was called for the purpose of securing united party action against the resolution looking to reestablishment, and numbers who were expected were made for and against the proposal.

It was found that three or four of the democratic members were so pledged that they could not vote to refuse to permit the voters to pass on the question. In an attempt to secure a quorum, without an agreement, it is known that some of the democrats will vote to put the liquor question into politics once more.

Tightened Up on Liquor Sales.

The senate passed a bill by Hammill to require that the blanks on which application is made for liquor at drug stores shall be marked by the county auditor and bear a facsimile of his signature and be numbered and recorded so that the state will have accurate knowledge as to liquor sales by permit holders. A provision in the bill to have the county clerk sign these blanks was stricken out. An effort was made to put into the blank a statement that the permit holder shall not be allowed to sell liquor, but this failed on a tie vote.

The house passed a bill regarding assignment of life insurance policies, a bill regarding proof of death in insurance cases, and a bill relating to entrance to the school for the deaf, so that indigent persons may not be deprived of education.

Reform of the Ballot Law.

The senate committee on elections proposes to take up and consider this week some important bills relating to the form of ballots. The Peterson bill provides for a uniform ballot and has further been agreed on all hands that the recommendation of the biennial message for a provision of the law in this regard must be followed.

The Peterson bill is to provide for rotation of names, making a change for every 100 ballots printed. Representative Lee is convinced that this would be too expensive a plan and has introduced a bill which removes the inequalities in this way: On state candidates a change in certifying out to the various counties so that in the state as a whole each candidate has his name first as often as any other; on county and district offices a rotation by precincts to accomplish the same end.
