Widow of Late Bishop Died Suddenly Yesterday.

NEW YORK, March 5.—Mrs. Elizabeth Scriben Potter, widow of Bishop Henry C. Potter, died today at her home here after an illness extending over several days.

Mrs. Potter, whose first husband, Alford Corning Clark, left her an estate of several millions, was much interested in charity, and it was through her interest in charitable institutions conducted by the Protestant Episcopal church that the friendship which was first formed which resulted in her marriage to the late bishop.

Protest Against Tariff Change.
