

FATHER FINDS GIRL AT LAST

says He Searchs for Her for Four Years.

SHE WAS IN A LOCAL CONVENT

Young Woman Abandons the Convent from Blame of Keeping Her Husband Known of the Father's Desire.

NOTICE SWORN, a girl living at the Convent of the Good Shepherd, was brought before Judge Leake Saturday afternoon on a writ of habeas corpus secured by her father, Marcus Sworn, a farmer, and released from the convent.

Sworn held a trial in the court house of the town that his daughter was not allowed to communicate with him and alleged that he never saw her through a window that word came. His petition recited that the girl was unlawfully and illegally retained without process of law and against her will in the Convent of the Good Shepherd.

That the cause and reason of said unusual detention is unknown to him, but he believes the fact to be that such detention is for religious purposes and therefore unlawful.

His petition also sets forth that a plea for release had been unanswered and that he had been denied the right to see his daughter. Deputy Sheriff Thompson went to the convent to get the girl, who was confined before the court in the afternoon.

At the hearing in the afternoon Judge Leake granted the writ. Father and daughter both took the stand. Sworn, who lives in Superior, Neb., testified that he had been searching four years for the girl, that he had recently located her and come to Omaha Friday in the afternoon. He stated that he was then denied permission to see her.

Mrs. Sworn, who appeared in court in the plain garb that residents of the convent wear, and with her hair cut short, recited that she did not think the convent authorities would have detained her if she had expressed a wish to leave Friday, but that she did not know her father was here until he came with the deputy sheriff Saturday. She expressed a desire to leave the convent and to go home with her father. Showall & Showall appeared for the plaintiff.

Lent Comes Before Good St. Patrick, Says the Bishop

So the Hibernians Who Prepared Feast for Scannell Must Postpone It, Says Prelate.

In their enthusiasm over the memory of St. Patrick and the return of Right Rev. Richard Scannell from three months trip abroad, the Ancient Order of Hibernians forgot all about Lent and the many days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday, which must be observed at least once. Their invitations must be recalled, or the dinner will be without guests if there has been a guesstimate.

It was only a slip of the memory and the error probably was discovered early, but not soon enough to prevent the banquet in honor of the return of Bishop Scannell and the sending out of invitations.

Then came the announcement by officers that March 17 was not only St. Patrick's day, but it was also one of the forty days of Lent and a fast day at that. The bishop, who would decline to attend, as much as he would regret to disappoint those who wanted to arrange a banquet for him. But the banquet is off—for several weeks, at least, until after Easter Sunday.

By coincidence, St. Patrick's day will be observed in the usual quiet way. By some others there will probably be a few dances and other celebrations. But the Hibernians admit of their mistake and say the matter was not discussed—simply thought of it, the same as any other day until some one called attention to the impropriety of holding such a joy-fest during Lent.

Plan to Remove County Prisoners

Transfer from Old Jail to New One Will Take Place a Week Hence.

The migration of "the detained" from the old county jail to the new city prison house will occur in about a week. One hundred and twenty-nine men and women are to anticipate the first of May in moving. The plan now is to move first the women, juvenile and insane cases all in the man's department, turn the present "bull pen" prisoners into the man's rooms, and put the "bound-over" in the bull pen. Then the upper cages and cells can be taken down and put up in the new building.

HANIGHEN RESUMES WORK ON NORTH OMAHA SEWER

Cold Weather Over. Contractor Resumes Operations Near North Omaha Sewer Under Interruption.

Work on the North Omaha main sewer was resumed Saturday by J. A. Hanighen, the city contractor. Work was stopped the first of the year on account of the cold weather, but now the contractor believes he can go ahead without any further delay. The sewer is about one-fifth done and the contract calls for completion by May 1.

There has been no cessation in the construction of the Union Pacific's section of the sewer and its crews have gone ahead every day during the past winter no matter how cold it might be. It is expected that this section of the sewer will be done before the last of the month.

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Christie Grain Company of Kansas City, Kan., Fails

Firm with Branches in Five States is Unable to Meet Its Obligations.

KANSAS CITY, March 6.—The Christie Grain company of Kansas City, Kan., has failed. Judge Fletcher of the Wyandotte county district court appointed W. M. Whitlow as receiver for the firm at 3 o'clock tonight. The facilities will reach about \$25,000.

The Christie company was the heaviest operator of grain, stocks and provisions on the Kansas Board of Trade. It had 100 correspondents in the principal cities in Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska and Colorado.

Two hours after the "tickets" and telegraph instruments were silenced and the fifty employees discharged and paid off a petition alleging insolvency was presented to Judge F. L. Fletcher on behalf of C. C. Christie, owner of 36 shares of the company's stock. The petition set forth that the assets were less than the indebtedness of the company and because of the danger of the creditors attaching the assets and dissipating them in costs and expenses a receiver was named.

Acting upon the petition, Judge Fletcher appointed Mr. Whitlow, an attorney, as receiver for the company. Twenty minutes later the receiver took charge of the company's headquarters. The Christie Grain company was organized in Kansas City, Kan., about two years ago under a Kansas charter with a capital stock of \$200,000. C. C. Christie of Kansas City, Mo., owner of the most stock, was president. Bruce Detrich of Kansas City, Kan., was vice president, treasurer and general manager. J. R. Tinker was secretary. The company has been operating in Kansas City, Kan., since the organization of the Kansas Board of Trade two years ago, when the Missouri law taxing grain and stock transactions became operative.

The Christie company has no offices in this city, but is reported to grain men to have several in towns in the South Platte country. The Omaha firms, however, are said to get their market reports over the Christie wires. There are the Pollock Commission company, with offices in the New York Life building, and the Shinn Commission company, with offices in the Standard building.
