

Council Bluffs POLICE LOOK FOR MISSING Sister Asks Man Who Threatened to Drown Himself Be Located. DAUGHTER WANTED BY PARENTS Young Man with Whom She Was Keeping Company Held on Suspicion of Knowing Something of Whereabouts.

Council Bluffs not be 16 years of age until April 16, has been employed as a photographer studio on Broadway, Saturday evening Mrs. Briggs found a note from her daughter which had been shoved under the front door, in which she said she was going to get married and that she was going to Chicago, where the marriage would take place. She did not mention the name of the person she was going to marry, merely said he was a "friend."

Mrs. Laura Cheney of Carson, Ia., requested the police yesterday to try to secure some trace of her brother, Otto Jones, whose home is about eight miles west of the town of Oakland, Pottawattamie county. Jones, according to what Mrs. Cheney reported to the police, left his home last Thursday and came to Council Bluffs. From this city he wrote to both his wife and father saying that he intended committing suicide by drowning himself in the Missouri river. Since then the members of his family have heard nothing from him.

The girls' father learned that she had been keeping company with young Lindstrom, whose home was in Chicago and who had been working here as a second cook in a restaurant. When picked up by the police last night Lindstrom denied any knowledge of the missing girl's whereabouts, but said he had a date with her for 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. As Lindstrom was said to be without employment at present, the police decided to look him up on a charge of vagrancy.

Parents Want Daughter. Jennie Briggs, the 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Briggs, 19 North Seventeenth street, is missing from her home since Saturday and her mother yesterday was almost prostrated with anxiety over the girl's disappearance. Charles Lindstrom, a young man with whom the girl was said to have been keeping company, was picked up by the police last night and locked up, as he is suspected of being responsible for her leaving her home.

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Original Co-operative Society Meets. ROCKWELL, Ia., March 8.—(Special.)—The Original Co-operative Farmers' Society of the World, which was founded here and is still doing business, held its annual meeting yesterday. This society is unique, in that fifteen or twenty years ago it was written into the city papers as the first and model one of its kind, and after it hundreds of others, most of which have proved successful, were patterned. The business done by it totaled \$98,942.25. The company handled 26,300 bushels of corn and 125,000 bushels of oats, besides vast quantities of farm produce of all kinds.
