Armour & Co. Installing Automatic Stokers in Power Plant.

NO HANDLING OF FUEL BY HAND

Theodore Te Pool Brings Another Injunction Suit Over the Paving Contract on East Q Street.

Armour & Co. are quietly making an extensive improvement in the furnace rooms of the South Omaha plant by constructing automatic stokers for the battery of boilers, a full automatic equipment for unloading coal and for conveying the ashes.

Armour & Co. have the largest battery of boilers of any plant in the city and the change means an improvement of great importance.

The Omaha Packing company has the only other automatic stoker in the city. The fact that the smoke from that stack is always a clear, pale blue, often almost invisible, has called forth many comments by visitors.

Girl Crushed in Elevator, Death Instant

Attempts to Jump Out While Cage is Moving and Caught Between it and Floor.

Hannah Palmquist, a 16-year-old girl, employed in the millinery department of the Brandeis store, was instantly killed in an elevator accident at the store about 5:42 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

She attempted to jump out while riding in the freight elevator from the first to the second floor. They neglected to call their floor, and when the second floor was passed two girls jumped out of the moving car safely and the Palmquist girl attempted to do so.

Although Mrs. Porter, Hoffman and W. O. Heiser soon arrived at the scene of the tragedy, which was in the southwest corner of the building, it was found that life had been extinct before the body of the girl had been released from its position.

The services of the physicians were required, however, as several other girls who had witnessed the accident, some fainted away, two had to be taken home in carriages and Ellen Palmquist, the older and only sister of the dead girl, is still in a serious state of nervousness at the family home, 412 1/2 Hamilton street.

The victim of the accident had been employed as a cash girl and helper at the Brandeis store since last September. The fact that the girls in the elevator could jump out of the moving car is explained by the kind of doors in use on the elevator shaft, which swung outward and could be opened by being merely pushed.

Robert U. Wolfe, city inspector of boilers and elevators, gave a thorough inspection Wednesday of all the elevators in the Brandeis building and found them to be in good condition, including the freight elevator in which Miss Palmquist was killed the evening before.
