Budget Conference at Calvary Baptist Church Tuesday.

IS IMPORTANT TO CHURCHMEN

Large Attendance of Clergy and Laity is Expected and Fruitful Results Are Anticipated.

One of the most important events in Baptist circles for many months will be the Budget conference to be held at Calvary Baptist church Tuesday.

The Rev. L. C. Barnes has long been a distinguished leader of the Baptist denomination. He has been wonderfully successful as a pastor and has built up some of the largest churches in the east. His work in home and foreign missions has also attracted much attention.

The presence of these three men in Omaha at one time is an event which should not be missed.
