European Advances on Wheat Are of Good Tone. LIVERPOOL OPENING IS HIGH Domestic Markets Answer Promptly to Their Advance and Wheat Values Improve as Result of Reports.

OMAHA, March 24, 1909.—European advances on wheat of good tone and the Liverpool opening was well up over the close yesterday. The domestic market answered readily to their advance and coupled with plenty of local damage reports, our wheat values again took an upward turn. The corn market was less active, but grew strong as the advance in wheat became more definite. Receipts from the west show a moderate decrease during planting and with a fair demand, better prices are expected. Wheat started up at the noon and grew stronger throughout the session. Higher Liverpool cables and numerous damage reports from the winter wheat sections aided a good advance and values closed at the top. May wheat opened at \$1.09 and closed at \$1.10. Corn was steady and much firmer with wheat, showing a stronger feeling and cash prices were advanced, regardless of the steady option market. Receipts from the west and a good demand, gave the market an excellent tone at the close. May opened at 66c and closed at 67c. Primary wheat receipts were 48,000 bushels and shipments were 25,000 bushels. Minimum receipts from the west were 200,000 bushels and shipments of 150,000 bushels. Corn receipts were 500,000 bushels and shipments were 300,000 bushels. Clearances of 1,000 bushels of corn, one of oat and wheat and flour equal to 2,500 bushels. NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Days' Operations Largely in the Hands of Smaller Professionals. READING ISSUES ARE BID UP Rise Due to Belief That Will Be No Strike of Anthracite Miners—Outage of Gold Checked.

NEW YORK, March 24.—In the absence of positive news developments affecting property values, operators in stocks today acted largely on deductions from the negative side. The operations were reported wholly in the hands of the smaller professional class and were significant, therefore, of nothing more than the usual fluctuations in the local traction shares had not resulted in bringing on the market any considerable quantity of other shares was indicative of the good relating power of the market.
