Without warning, the raiders poured a storm of builets into the wagon in which were Alleman Emge. and Lazier and into the body of Joe Emge. All three were killed instantly. The raiders then assailed the second wagon, but did not open fire on it. and its two occupants were taken into custody, driven some distance and turned loose, with instructions to keep traveling, not look behind and not tell of what they had seen. These sur-

to Tensleep. After running off the herders whose lives were spared, the raiders returned to the camp, poured oil on the wagon containing the bodies and set it afire. Both corpses were burned to a crisp. The body of Joe Emge, sprawled in the snow so close to the burning wagon it was singed, was not moved.

vivors lost no time in carrying the alarm

Alleman Emge, the owner of the raided. camp, until recently was engaged in the cattle business, but sold out and went into sheep. It is reported that he was warned he could not run sheep in the Tensleep country and live, but he disregarded the warning. The section where the triple assassination took place has always been a cattle country and regarded by the cattlemen as their own and not to be invaded by sheep.

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
