BIG CITIES LOOKING FOR MEN

George D. Melklejohn Advises Citi-
zens of Omaha to Go to Polls.

ENOUGH OF DEMOCRATS ALREADY

Victor Rosewater Calls Attention to
This Generally Expressed Sentiment
of Their Own Party Organs.

Harmony and confidence were the watch-
words of the Central Republican club at
a rousing meeting held at the club rooms
Thursday night, when George D. Melklejohn,
former secretary of war and
Victor Rosewater were the principal
speakers. James Walsh, president of the
club, was in the chair and most of the
candidates on the republican ticket also
spoke.

"Men in what all the larger cities are
now looking for in the administration of
their public affairs," said George D. Mel-
klejohn, "City after city has been re-
solved to open its eyes to the fact that
the right men have not been placed in
office. Did you ever notice that the man
who complains the loudest against his
boss or because some measure is intro-
duced to an office is the man who stays away
from the polls on the day of the primaries
and allows some one else to make his
choice for him? It is given to every Ameri-
can citizen to protect his own interests
and the interests of his neighbors, and if
he does not do it in his own manner it
is to the affairs of Omaha are not adminis-
tered for the benefit of the people it is because
the people do not go to the polls to do
their duty. If you want the affairs of this
city to be in control of the republican
party go to the polls and vote the straight
republican ticket. If you fail to vote
straight the first thing you know a precinct
has slipped away from you, then a county
and soon the state. The lower house of
congress will soon go and the party will
soon lose the administration of national
affairs.

Conditions of Perfect Harmony.
"Tonight we find a condition where all
contentions has been blotted out from the
republican ranks, a condition of perfect
harmony and the party united. I predict
a larger vote for the republican party in
May than was ever cast in Omaha before."
"I have known John F. Brown, the head
of your ticket, for the last twenty-five
years, and the republican party has named
a standard-bearer who is a man of the
greatest probity and who will be a credit
to the city of Omaha in any position in
which he is placed. He will make no dis-
tinction between the man of wealth and
the man who toils."

"You have nominated a man for city at-
torney whom I have known since the early
'80s, and I want to say that Nelson Pratt
is a man whose honor and integrity will
be the same in public office as it has been
in handling the affairs of his clients."
"Go to the polls and vote for the men
named by the votes of a majority of your
party and you will have done your duty
to your party. There is no reason why
every republican should not love the prin-
ciples of his party and stand with it
May 4."

Republicans Turn to Win.
"It is our turn to win this spring," said
Victor Rosewater, editor of The Bee. "The
people of Omaha seem to need an object
lesson every once in a while, and once in
about every fourteen years they elect a
democratic administration, and the peo-
ple of the state do the same thing about
every ten years.

"Although the governor has been in of-
fice and the democratic legislature in ses-
sion about three months, from what their
own democratic papers are saying I think
the people of the state have had enough
of them already."

"Every man on the republican ticket in
head and shoulders above his adversary on
the democratic ticket, and that is putting
the comparison mildly."

"The democrats are going to conduct this
campaign along the same lines as before.
Tomorrow night they will go through the
form of making a platform as long as
from here to Council Bluffs, and there will
be as many planks as there are blades
of grass on the prairie between here and
Council Bluffs, and each plank will prom-
ise something intended to gull a few voters.

"The thing for the republicans to do is
simply to point to the two object lessons
of democratic administration, city and
state. They promised as much as they
could and delivered as little as possible.
Their own newspapers denounce their
broken pledges, and if they were intro-
duced under false pretenses the people ought
to be reminded not to be fooled again by
the same fellow."

"The real question is to give the city a
government by men competent to perform
the work and who will not promise to do
things they know they cannot do and who
will uphold the reputation of the city so
that when Omaha people travel away from
home they won't have the disgraceful per-
formances of their official representatives
thrown up to them."

Eleventh Ward Organization.
An organization among the republicans
of the Eleventh ward, calculated to roll
up a snug republican majority in that ward
at the coming municipal election, was ef-
fected Thursday evening at the Howard
club rooms, 186 Howard street. Howard
H. Baldrige was unanimously chosen pres-
ident, F. C. Rogers elected secretary and
August H. Schroeder treasurer.

The appointment of an active and en-
ergetic executive committee to act in con-
junction with the ward members of the cen-
tral committee, was also provided for and
the rest of the meeting was given over
to addresses by the voters present.

"Partisanship has been placed above pub-
lic policy by the present democratic adminis-
tration," declared President Baldrige of
the club. "The democrats in power have
used their position to strengthen democracy
in the city and state and the voters and
taxpayers have suffered. They have there-
fore failed to do their duty to the citizens,
for Omaha has suffered while the demo-
crats have prospered."

"What have they done to deserve re-
election? Not one thing. They have shown
no wisdom in administering the affairs of
the municipal government, have lacked ef-
ficiency and the employment of economy.
They have not imposed taxes and have passed
no ordinances for the benefit of the public.
In fact, their whole regime has been a
negative one."

Attitude of Special Interests.
That special interests and the franchised
corporations favor a negative adminis-
tration was outspokenly declared by Judge
Blalough and ex-Congressman John L.
Kennedy.
