NO SECRETARY YET NAMED
Governor Said to Be Making Deal on Banking Officer.

ASK POINT ON PRINTING BOARD
Would Name Royce Secretary if He Is Allowed to Name Printing Clerk—May Do So, Anyhow.

LINCOLN, April 22.—(Special.)—Governor Shallenberger has not yet named his secretary of the State Banking board, nor named his numerous examiners, because Governor Shallenberger is doing some thinking. The governor is now building up his political machine for future use in his race for the senate and there is every reason to believe he will be a candidate for the democratic nomination unless he receives the nomination in his race for the senate.

The governor has proposed that if he be permitted to name the secretary of the State Printing board he will reappoint Ed Royce secretary of the Banking board. Auditor Barton and Secretary of State Johnson are the members of the Printing board. Royce is the governor's first choice for the position of secretary of the Banking board.

The mention of Richard L. Metcalfe as a senatorial possibility has affected the attitude of the party up in the air and has carried consternation to some of the democratic strongholds. For instance, in the World-Herald office the editor of the paper is said to be very much worried and he is quoted as having made this remark when his attention was called to the Metcalfe story: "That is liable to be serious before the campaign is over."

Overlord Mullen is said to be equally disturbed, while W. H. Thompson, and the other democratic "leaders" have not yet reported, but as they all threw fits when it was suggested that the printer be appointed to a seat in the national democratic convention and several more on top of those when he was mentioned for governor, the editor of the Commoner is expected to have the hearty opposition of these persons.

The mention of Metcalfe as a senatorial possibility will have some effect, no doubt upon the appointments Governor "Mullenberger" makes and it is very probable the applicant will have to make known his ideas about senatorial candidates as one of the qualifications for the job.

Engineers May Be Delegates.
Engineers who have an interest in irrigation are requested to notify Governor Shallenberger. In return the governor will appoint fifteen of the number as delegates to represent the great state of Nebraska at the irrigation congress to be held in Spokane on August 9 to 14. All expenses will be paid by the delegates and irrigation will not cost at \$4,000.

Board Members Qualify.
Members of the new State Normal board got busy early this morning and filed with the secretary of state their oaths of office attached to their certificates of appointment. It was pointed out in the Bee this morning that the members of the board had failed to qualify, though the board had transacted some business. By noon every member of the board had his oath on file.

Governor Invited to Valentine.
Governor Shallenberger has received an invitation to visit Valentine on his road to Crawford or on his return from there, July 4. The governor is invited to bring along his staff, and A. M. Mortissney, who sent the invitation, promised the biggest

Elkhorn Farmer Shoots Himself Through Heart
First Makes Target of Cup of Coffee Wife Had Just Brought Him—Ill Health Cause.

EIKHORN, Neb., April 22.—(Special Telegram.)—George Eggers, a prosperous farmer living a mile and one-half north of Elkhorn, shot himself through the heart this morning about 9:30 o'clock, while in bed. Death was almost instantaneous. Mr. Eggers had been in Omaha, Tuesday, and returned late at night and was seemingly depressed. This morning he did not get up at the usual time and about 9:30 his wife took a cup of coffee into his room and placed it on a chair near the bed. As soon as she was gone Eggers drew his revolver, shot the cup into pieces and then sent a bullet through his heart. No reason except ill health and worry over the operation of his 50-acre farm could be ascribed. While he was prosperous financially his business cares seemed to weigh on him.

Morland Says He is Guilty
Young Forger Asks Mercy of Court at Tecumseh and is Given Eighteen Months.

TECUMSEH, Neb., April 22.—(Special Telegram.)—In the district court here today Frank Morland of Richardson county pleaded guilty to the charges of forgery, made in this county, on a check for the mercy of the court. Judge L. M. Pemberton sentenced him to the penitentiary for eighteen months at hard labor. Forged checks were passed on Sterling banks three years ago and two innocent Johnson county boys were accused of the crime, but were afterwards acquitted. Four Wives of One Man.
FREMONT, Neb., April 22.—(Special.)—Peter Callaghan, a Northwestern passenger brakeman, was arrested yesterday as a deserter from the regular army at Columbus, O. His arrest is said to be due to the fact that there were no less than four women whom he passed off as his wife. All of the four are said to have left town. Heavy Snowfall in North Nebraska

Building Room at Hastings
Many New Structures of Public Character Are Under Way.

HASTINGS, Neb., April 22.—(Special.)—Hastings surely has a building boom. Shortly after the first of the year the auditorium was finished and opened for use. Later work was started on the building of the United Brethren church and this structure is now nearly finished. Within the last few days contracts have been awarded for the erection of new buildings for the First Congregational and German Congregational churches. Almost within the same period the new church of the Seventh Day Adventists was dedicated and opened for use, both for religious and school purposes.

World Sell Plattsmouth Plant.
PLATTSMOUTH, Neb., April 22.—(Special.)—J. A. Sunderland, George H. Waring, J. F. Flack and J. Levy of Omaha attended a meeting of the city council here last evening in an endeavor to have that body reconsider its action in passing an ordinance to reduce the price of gas to \$130 per 1,000 cubic feet. Mr. Sunderland stated that the original plant to manufacture gas and electric light here had been capitalized at \$30,000 and was bid in for foreclosure sale by the New Hampshire Saving bank to protect the bondholders, and the bank now owns \$2,000 of the bonds and the Omaha news the remainder. He also stated that the plant could not now be duplicated for \$60,000. The gross receipts for the last year had been less than the expenses, and the company could not manufacture and sell
