

Owing to a sensational decline of \$2.00%d in wheat at Liverpool the market here opened greatly demoralized and with prices ranging all the way from 1%c to \$3.00 below the final quotations yesterday, July being at \$1.07.01.08% and May at \$1.194.01.20%. The September delivery joined company with the December option below the dollar mark for a brief period at the start, when it sold at \$9.00. The severe slumip at Liverpool was said to be due to greatly increased offerings of Argentina and Indian wheat at lower prices, and to continued favorable reports regarding the European crop. The selling furors subaided to some extent after the first few minutes and a much calmer feeling was manifested. With the exception of the May and December delivery prices held within the opening range. Toward the middle of the day May declined attil further to \$1.18 while the time.
