CROUNSE DIES WITH DAY

Former Governor Expires as the Clock Strikes Twelve.

WILL BE BURIED BESIDE WIFE

Requests that His Body Be Laid in the Family Lot at Fort Calhoun—Synopsis of His Life.

Former Governor Lorenzo Crouse died on the stroke of midnight Thursday. He had been ill for a long time, and at different periods of his illness had seemed on the verge of death, but had rallied in rather remarkable fashion. For the last few days the former governor had been falling rapidly, and hope of recovery was practically abandoned early in the week. Most of Wednesday and all of Thursday Mr. Crouse was in a state of coma, with occasional moments of consciousness.

MURDERER SHOT BY POSSE

William L. Lansing of Presho, S. D., is Killed While Resisting Arrest.

HAD BEATEN WIFE TO DEATH

Her Body Was Hidden in Cellar—Crime Prompted by Refusal to Dissolve Divorce Suit.

When 21 years of age he began the study of law and was admitted to the bar in 1887, at Ft. Plain, Montgomery county, N. Y., opening an office in that town, where he practiced until the breaking out of the civil war, when he raised at Ft. Plain Battery K, First regiment, New York Light artillery, being chosen captain of the company. He served four years and was engaged in several battles, being twice wounded, while holding Beverly's ford on the Rappahannock river. When partially recovered he resigned his command and in 1864 moved to Nebraska, settling at Rulo, in Richardson county.

Iowa Husband Dies Heroically, But in Vain

Wife Tried to Start the Kitchen Fire with Kerosene, and Both Succumbed.

CRESTON, Ia., May 14.—(Special.)—News of a terrible tragedy comes from Nodaway, whereby Mr. and Mrs. Victor Dicks of that place both lost their lives from the effects of burns received in a fire Sunday morning through an explosion from using kerosene oil to start the kitchen fire. Mrs. Dicks, who was starting the fire, was so badly injured that she died the same evening and Mr. Dicks succumbed to his injuries Wednesday. A family of six small children are left in straitened circumstances.

Declines Renomination

Governor Crouse declined a renomination to the bench at the expiration of his judicial term, but in 1872 was nominated on the third ballot in state convention for member of the lower house of congress. He was elected that fall against General Elias A. Strickland and John Taffe, receiving 17,000 of the 27,800 votes cast. He was re-elected to congress in 1874, but in 1876 was defeated for the senate.

At Close of his Congressional Campaign

Mr. Crouse took up his abode on a farm in Washington county and in 1879 was appointed internal revenue collector for Nebraska by President Hayes. Twelve years later President Harrison appointed him assistant secretary of the treasury. In 1893 the republican party nominated Mr. Crouse for governor, against his desire, and in the election that fall he won by a majority of about 10,000 votes over J. Sterling Morton, the democratic nominee, and General Charles H. Van Wyck, the populist nominee. He was inaugurated on January 4, 1893, and served one term, refusing a renomination in 1894 through the medium of a letter to the public. Becoming a private citizen once more, the former governor resided on his farm in Washington county until 1900, when he was nominated and elected a member of the state senate, which body came near electing him to the United States senate to fill out the unexpired term caused by the death of Senator Hayward.

Governor Crouse was married to Miss Mary E. Griffiths in 1859 and to this union one son and three daughters were born: William G., Jesse, Evelyn and Marie. The eldest daughter is now Mrs. Gilbert M. Hitchcock and the second is Mrs. George M. McIntyre. Mrs. Crouse died in 1882.

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BRADSTREET'S REVIEW OF TRADE

Irregularity Still Characterizes Crop and Industrial Situation.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Irregularity still characterizes the trade, crop and industrial situation. In industrial lines the consensus of reports is that further improvement has been registered, especially in the iron and steel, coal, coke, woolen manufacturing and leather trades. Building is active and lines of trade catering to this industry are feeling beneficial effects. It is a between-seasons period in wholesale and jobbing distributive trade; orders from retailers are merely of a filling in character and hardly equal to expectations.

Business failures in the United States for the week ending May 15 were 224 against 214 last week, 201 in the like week of 1908, 164 in 1907, 151 in 1906 and 191 in 1905. Canadian failures for the week number 31 against 25 last week and 2 in the like week of 1908. Wheat, including flour, exports from the United States and Canada for the week ending May 15 aggregated 1,230,000 bushels, against 1,452,000 bushels last week and 2,507,000 bushels the week before.
