Sudden Death of H. H. Rogers Has Little Effect on the Market.

POWER OF RESISTANCE IS STRONG.

Anxiety that Speculators' Position is Unstable and Vulnerable is Proven Without Foundation.

NEW YORK, May 19.—The stock market has rarely met the death of a capitalist of H. H. Rogers today.

The anxiety professed for several days past that the speculative market had become unstable and vulnerable, from passive resistance to depression, the tone passed to one of strength.

Prices have suffered more serious setbacks in the aftermath of Mr. Rogers' death of serious illness than happened to them following his death.

The impression of the strong underlying condition of the stock market position was the loss of the price leaders.
