

TEN COWS DOOMED TO DIE

Tubercular Cattle Taken from Three Dairies by Health Officer.

CONNELL ORDERS THEM KILLED

All Dairies of East Omaha Consent to Tuberculin Test and City Veterinarian Will Begin His Work There.

Ten cows in three dairies supplying milk in Omaha have been condemned by C. C. Hall, D. V. S., city veterinarian, for having tuberculosis, and the condemned cows will be killed.

Six of the cows condemned belonged to the herd of ten in Sam P. Sorenson's dairy at Sixth street and Avenue K, East Omaha.

The condemned cows will be taken to the South Omaha stock yards and killed under the supervision of Dr. R. W. Connell, city commissioner of health and the government inspectors stationed in the packing houses.

All Consents to Test. All the dairies in East Omaha have consented to the tuberculin test and the city veterinarian will work there first.

The cows are treated by withholding food for two days. The temperature is taken every two hours on both days and if this varies two or more degrees on the second day after tuberculin has been injected the cow is condemned.

Customers of the dairies where cows have been condemned need have no fear of buying milk of them in the future, said Dr. Connell, for the tuberculous cows have been taken out of the herd and those left are all right.

AL KEENAN IS BOUND OVER

Held to Trial on Charge of Attempted Jury Bribing.

JUDGE LESLIE ROASTS BARRETT

Court Declares that Principal Witness Against Keenan Deliberately Perjured Himself, but Was Corroborated in Part.

Al Keenan was bound over to the present term of the district court by County Judge Leslie Saturday morning to face a charge of attempted jury bribing.

The court's finding was announced to about all the men the court room would hold and this and the clash between attorneys who followed attest the tenacity of interest in the case.

Judge Leslie had scored Justice Jesse G. Barrett in announcing the court's findings with regard to Keenan and this gave A. W. Jeffers of Keenan's counsel a foothold for the following:

"I would suggest to the court that the county attorney proceed against Barrett." "Speaking for the county attorney," replied English, "I will say that he is not taking suggestions from lawyers hostile to his side and who are in the attitude of disappointed suitors."

"The county attorney could probably get a South Omaha lawyer to make a suggestion," interjected J. J. O'Connor.

"If I lodged informations," returned English, "against everyone whom there is grave suspicion, the list would probably include a large number of my acquaintance."

At this point the court stopped the repartee which was fast becoming hectic. Court Roasts Barrett.

"I appreciate the gravity and importance of this hearing," declared Judge Leslie on announcing his decision, "and I have undertaken to watch the evidence very closely throughout, and in the conduct of the trial to keep on the safe side admitting all evidence, which from any phase was entitled to be considered."

"I was fortified indeed in my conclusion in regard to the testimony of Barrett. There is no room for mistake to have been made about the insurance. It was not a case of mis-statement and correction but of deliberate perjury."

"While the point was not in one sense material, yet it tended to discredit his whole evidence and were the state's case resting on him alone, it would not be sufficient to bind the defendant over."

"But he is corroborated as to the incidents of the meeting by VanCleve although there is a discrepancy between them as to the exact language of the defendant."

"The meeting occurred is also corroborated by the testimony of Keenan. The court added that the hearing was not one of the cause on its merits and discussed briefly the difference between a preliminary hearing and an actual trial.

He concluded by declaring that there was "probable cause" to assume that a crime had been committed and "probable cause" to assume that the defendant committed it. Accordingly he would bind Keenan over.

CONNELL OPPOSES NEW TRIAL

Charges Henry Murphy with Inspiring Jury Bribing Suit.

W. J. Connell filed an affidavit in district court Saturday morning with regard to the trial of Stewart against the street railway company, as part of his showing why a new trial should not be granted.

The plaintiff filed last week affidavits by Barrett and VanCleve in regard to the alleged attempt of Al Keenan to bribe Judge Leslie for a new trial before Judge Day Saturday morning, but on account of the size of the showing by Connell argument was not concluded and the motion will go over until next week.

Mr. Connell's showing includes a complete transcript of the evidence in the second trial, the finding of the supreme court on the case, and a transcript of the evidence of Barrett and VanCleve before Judge Leslie in the Keenan preliminary hearing.

The affidavit which he filed is largely an attack on Attorney Henry C. Murphy, by whom the Keenan matter had its inception, says the affidavit. It runs as follows:

"Affiant further says that the charge of tampering with, or attempting to bribe two jurors in this case has its origin with one Henry C. Murphy, who is the attorney for one Anderson, in a certain damage suit against the street railway company, now pending in this court at this time, and which was tried at the last term of this court and resulted in a disagreement of the jury; the jury standing, as the affiant is informed and believes, right for the defendant and in favor of the plaintiff."

"Affiant further states as the ground for believing and stating that said charge of attempted bribery had its origin with the said Henry C. Murphy, and that it was a 'put up job' by him; that said Anderson case was on the call for trial at the time of the trial of this case and was expected soon to be reached for trial, and the said Murphy, well knowing that the said Anderson case was likely to be reached and called for trial before the present jury panel, had interviewed at his office with the juror Barrett and attempted to influence said Barrett in favor of the plaintiff in said Anderson case, and to prejudice said Barrett and his associate, VanCleve, against the street railway company, and was for the further purpose of wrongfully creating a sentiment against the said street railway company and its defense of pending damage suit, and especially in the said Anderson case, all of which will more fully and at large appear in the testimony of said Barrett and other said witnesses taken before the county court in the case of the State against Keenan."

"Affiant further says that immediately following the trial of this case and the return of the verdict of the jury herein, and before any charge of attempted bribery by Keenan was made public, the manner of said Murphy with reference to said Anderson case underwent a complete change, and its place of being eloquent and social with this affiant and talking in favor of the settlement of said Anderson case, he became independent and defiant in his manner and demanded a settlement double the sum which he previously had stated to this affiant he would be willing to accept."

Connell said that he expected to file an affidavit by VanCleve that he was not influenced in his verdict in the Stewart case by the conversation alleged to have been had with him by Keenan.
