Lysle Abbott Offers Bond and it is Refused

Dry Excise Board Candidates Take Perfunctory Action to Get Legal Status.

Lysle L. Abbott, one of the candidates of the Anti-Saloon league for the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners, offered his official bond to the city clerk Saturday noon, but that official refused to accept it.

"When were you elected?" asked Deputy City Clerk Dally of Mr. Abbott, and the latter replied that he was elected on May 4, though he said he has received no certificate of election.

The clerk refused the bond for the reason that it had not been approved by a district judge. Mr. Abbott said that as he read the charter and the statutes of the state the bond did not have to be approved, but that he would look this up before Monday.

"The Abbott bond is with the National Fidelity and Casualty company and says: 'The condition of this obligation is such that whereas Lysle L. Abbott was on the 4th day of May, 1909, elected to the office of fire and police commissioner of Omaha for the term of three years, or until his successor is duly elected and qualified.'"

The filing of the bonds of the Anti-Saloon league candidates for the excise board is merely a perfunctory matter and to give the candidates a standing in the law in the event the supreme court overrules the decision of the lower court, whereby the republican and democratic committees filled their tickets by designating certain candidates for the board.

HOGGATT TIRED OF PLACE

President Makes Public Circumstances Surrounding Appointment of New Governor of Alaska.

With nothing to say about the appointment of Walter E. Clark to be governor of Alaska succeeding Governor Hoggatt before the latter's term of four years has expired, the following statement was made public at the White House today:

"Governor Hoggatt stated to the president a number of times his desire to be relieved of the office of governor and the appointment of Mr. Clark was not made until a telegram had been sent by Governor Hoggatt fixing a time when he asked to be relieved."
