Thirty-Six Million to Be Cut from Military Estimates for 1911.

WASHINGTON, May 25.-President Taft sent back to the War department the estimates submitted to him for the support of the military establishment for the fiscal year 1911 and indicated his desire that they should be cut approximately \$35,000,000. The estimates were prepared during Secretary Dickinson's visit to Panama and carefully scrutinized by Acting Secretary Oliver, who reduced them to \$171,650,000-\$18,600,000 less than the estimates for 1910, but about \$15,000,000 more than the appro-

riations for that year. When Mr. Taft saw the figures he expressed his wish that they be \$50,900,000 less than the appropriations for 1910. Assistant Secretary Oliver has succeeded n reducing the figures by \$18,000,000-half the amount asked for by the president and they have now been submitted to Secretary Dickinson for final consideration. If he reduces them to the extent the

president wants them cut, it will involve still further out of about \$18,000,000. The totals do not include expenses on account of the Panama canal nor the permanent annual appropriations. Army officers say the reduction in esti-

NEW YORK, May 25 Frank Duffy, a former Tammany district worker, convicted of registration frauds in the election of 1907, surrendered himself today and will begin serving in Sing Sing the prison term of from three and one-half to four and one-half years, to which he was sentenced hearly two years ago. Duffy has been at liberty on bail. Last week the appellate division of the supreme court confirmed the conviction. Duffy was accused of colonizing a number of negroes in upper West Side tenements and causing them to re-

wrapper, the same being attested as correct under oath.
