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

are here and selling at 40 cents a pound. They are shipped from California and are fine, meaty fruit.

Strawberries sold for 15 cents a box Friday morning, though some were cheaper. Pineapples are plentiful and the wise woman will put up her supply for the season while they are cheap. They sold Friday morning for from 7 cents for the smaller to 45 cents each for the giant size. As for the green stuff, everything is in now and in the full, luxuriant size that marks the home-grown product. The prices are also "home-grown" and convincing Butter is a little cheaper than it was, selling for 28 cents a pound for the best package creamery. Other butters range rom 23 to 28 cents a pound.
