A long speech, dealing with the pledge of party leaders with respect to a revision of the tariff, was begun by Senator La-Follette today and will be continued tomorrow. By numerous quotations he maintained that no question could be raised as to the pledge of the party for a revision downward, and he declared that before he should conclude his speech he would demonstrate amply that, on the whole, the pending bill placed the duties above the rates of the Dingley law.
