MRS. METCALFE TAKEN IN

Indictment Was Returned for Maintaining a Nuisance.

APPEARS AND GIVES \$1,000 BOND

Three Arrests of Men Indicted for Illegal Sale of Liquor in a Hotel to Missouri Valley Men.

Among the indictments returned last Saturday by the district court grand jury, was one against Mrs. Emma Metcalfe, proprietor of the Metcalfe hotel at 2737 West Broadway, which was not made public at the time. Mrs. Metcalfe was taken into custody yesterday on a bench warrant and gave bond in the sum of \$1,000. The indictment charges the maintenance of a nuisance during the months of March, April and May.

Testimony before the grand jury concerning the Metcalfe place was given by a number of residents in that locality, including several women and B. B. Wallace, former city councilman. Mr. Wallace testified that while driving past the Metcalfe hotel on Sunday, April 27, he saw several people drinking beer on the porch and that a party of men and women from Omaha in an automobile who were using profane language drew up at the place and just as he was driving past threw a number of beer bottles into his buggy. One of the women witnesses, a resident of that locality, testified that Mrs. Metcalfe came to her house one Sunday and invited her over to "take some beer." All of the witnesses gave the place a bad character.

Everett C. Goodrich, Ernest Jones and Cyrus Jackson were also arrested yesterday morning under an indictment returned Saturday by the grand jury. They are charged with the illegal sale of liquor and each gave a bond in the sum of \$500, with W. S. Goodrich, father of Everett Goodrich, as surety. The illegal sales are alleged to have taken place at the State hotel, 213 South Main street on certain Sundays in the month of May. In the indictment, it is also specifically charged that each of the three defendants had been before convicted of violation of the malt law.

One of the witnesses before the grand jury in this case was Thorwald Christensen, a resident of Missouri Valley, who testified that he had purchased liquor in a room of the State hotel on Sunday, May 23. The testimony of this witness is of special interest, in view of the fact that Rev. James M. Williams, pastor of the Broadway Methodist church, publicly stated at a meeting of the Law and Order League that he knew of young men from Missouri Valley coming to Council Bluffs and securing liquor on Sunday.

Another who testified to buying liquor at the State hotel on a Sunday was Harry Senft, who is understood to be a son of Charles W. Senft, one of the class leaders in Rev. Mr. Williams' church.

Five of the defendants indicted by the grand jury entered pleas of guilty when arraigned before Judge Wheeler yesterday and were given sentences in the county jail and were given sentences in the county jail and were given sentences in the county jail.

Charles M. Sanford, charged with intent to kill Claude B. Gano, secured his release yesterday on furnishing a bond in the sum of \$1,000, with Elmer Fehr and Wallace Benjamin as sureties. Sanford had been in the county jail since his arrest on April 15.

John O'Neill, against whom an indictment was returned on the charge of making threats to extort money, secured his release from the county jail last evening by furnishing a bond in the sum of \$500.

Emmet Tinley, attorney for Mrs. May Noble, proprietress of the Riverside hotel, yesterday paid into the office of the clerk of the district court \$250 balance of the \$1,000 bond which Mrs. Noble was fined last April on pleading guilty to violating the liquor law and maintaining a house of ill repute.
