KING JAMES WINS BIG STAKE

Hildreth Horse Makes New Record for Brooklyn Handicap.

RESTIGOUCHE COMES IN NEXT

No Attempt is Made to Interfere with the Layers of Odds—Results on Other Tracks.

NEW YORK, June 4.—King James, first; Restigouche, second; Celt, third.

Thus stands the record of the twenty-third, renewal of the historic Brooklyn handicap, run today at Gravesend. The three other starters—High Private, Frank Gill and Berkeley—finished as named, but were beaten off. The time, 2:04, establishes a record for the race, being one-fifth of a second better than the figures held up last year by Celt.

Coupled as the entry of Sam Hildreth, King James and Restigouche were quoted in the betting at 1 to 1 to win and 1 to 2 for place. Restigouche running alone was variously quoted, as high as 20 to 1 being laid against him to win, 8 to 1 for the place and 4 to 5 to show. James R. Keene's Celt was held at 1 to 2, seemingly prohibitive odds, and greatly disappointed a host of backers and made heartick those of the "memory brokers" who did not have the nerve to lay wagers against him.

Though mainly a race among three horses, the contest was exciting, and in every stage of the game was watched with interest by the spectators. Especially great was the excitement when a furlong from home King James pushed his nose in front of the flying Restigouche and inch by inch crept past him until at the wire he was leading his stable mate by a full length, while Restigouche was three lengths in front of the tired and floundering Celt. Aside from the great performance of Celt, the race run by Restigouche was the greatest surprise. Never credited with any too much game, the Keene castoff led from the rise of the barrier to the last furlong—and with speed that amazed all those behind him came King James.

The value of the stake today was \$5,000, \$2,000 less than that of last year. Of this amount the second horse received \$700 and the third \$200.

No attempt was made today to interfere with the layers-on-odds or betters. Gravesend was the scene of the commencement of the betting raids last year and there was much speculation as to how authorities of King county would treat the "memory brokers" today. In the first two races business was slack, owing to the presence of numerous plain clothes men and county detectives. As no interference was offered to those few who were accepting bets, most of the regular betters joined their conferees and openly displayed odds and accepted oral wagers. Summaries:

Fourth race, the Brooklyn handicap of \$5,000, 3-year-olds and up, one mile and a quarter, King James (12), Dugan, 3 to 1; won, Restigouche (14), Burns, 2 to 1; second, Celt (12), Bulwell, 1 to 3; third, Time: 2:04. Frank Gill, Berkeley and High Private also ran. King James and Restigouche coupled in straight and place betting only.

Fifth race, 3-year-olds, selling, mile and a sixteenth, \$500 added: Bonnie Kello (10), Upton, 5 to 1; won, Hammerless (10), Dugan, 7 to 1; second, Rostrum (10), McCahy, 6 to 1; third, Time: 1:48. Alice Wins Handicap.
CINCINNATI, O., June 4.—A handicap at a mile and a sixteenth was the feature of a good card of six races at Latonia today. Only three horses started in the handicap, Alice, the heavily played second choice, and Moquette, the odds-on favorite, fought it out all the way around. Alice finally getting the decision by half a length. Moquette beat John F. McMillen a head for the place. Four favorites won. Track muddy. Summaries:

FLAG TO FLAG CAR ARRIVES

Pathfinder Machine Reaches Mexico City After Hard Trip.

MEXICO CITY, Mex., June 4.—Fred Spooner, William Knopper and James M. Howard, in the Pathfinder machine for the flag to flag automobile race from Denver to Mexico City via El Paso next October, reached this city today at 1:30 o'clock from Tulsa, which point was reached only after a hard ride over rocky mountain roads for thirty-five miles in eighteen hours. During the journey the Pathfinders covered exactly 2,400 miles in the thirty-hour power automobile, and of this distance 2,100 miles represented the route of the tour. The days of the traveling numbered twenty-six, and the pathfinders believe the route laid out will prove the hardest of tests for the cars. They brought letters to President Diaz from Governor Shafroth of Colorado and Governor Curry of New Mexico, and letters to the American ambassador. The car will be presented either tomorrow or Saturday.

George A. Wahlgreen of Denver, donor of the flag to flag trophy, will reach the city tomorrow to conclude arrangements for the event. The start will be made some time in October and the route laid out by the pathfinder, with one exception—between El Paso and Chihuahua—will be followed. Members of the party say they were well treated by the Mexican people all along the route.

Cornhuskers Go to Iowa.
LINCOLN, June 4.—(Special.)—Coach Dr. Clark of the Nebraska track team is still confident his athletes stand an excellent chance of winning at the Missouri Valley college meet at Lincoln, Saturday. Before leaving Lincoln with his team today he said he looked for the best three or four miles to be between Nebraska and Iowa. He thought the biggest fight for first place would be between Nebraska and Iowa. The winner of the all-Iowa state college meet last Saturday.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 4.—Sheriff Frank Canales of Mobile was today declared guilty and ordered removed from office by the state supreme court in a decision which followed the trial of Canales on a charge of dereliction of duty in allowing a negro to be lynched in Mobile on January 21.

JURY SECURED FOR JACOBS

Prosecution Has Presented Most of Its Evidence.

STURGIS, S. D., June 4.—(Special Telegram.)—In circuit court this morning the examination of jurors was continued in the case of Oscar Jacobs, charged with the murder of Edna Roberts, and by noon there were ten jurors in the box. Early this afternoon the jury was completed. State's Attorney Mitek made an opening statement to the jury outlining the state's case, after which Alva Thurston, Mrs. Roberts, the stepmother of the deceased girl, Charles Smithers, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. White, in whose military paraders the tragedy occurred, and Deputy Sheriff Brown testified in behalf of the state.

Court then adjourned until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

DEATH RECORD.

Mrs. Ida Linden Green.
CRENSON, Ia., June 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ida Linden Green, wife of N. H. Green, a hardware merchant of this city, died very suddenly and unexpectedly yesterday afternoon at Cottage hospital. About two weeks ago she underwent an operation and was thought to be entirely out of danger, in fact, about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon she complained of a pain in her head, and in a few minutes expired. A diagnosis showed that a blood clot had formed in the lungs, causing death. Mr. and Mrs. Green came to this city six years ago from Grand Island, Neb., and previous to that time they were residents of Sioux City, where her parents still reside. Deceased was but 36 years of age, and beside her husband leave one son, 10 years old, and her aged parents.

Original Abolitionist Dead.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., June 4.—Henry F. Montague, one of the three dead men who organized an abolition party in Michigan in 1836 at Ann Arbor, is dead at his home here at the age of 96 years. Mr. Montague was one of the leading agents of the "Underground Railway" by which many fugitive slaves were assisted in their flight to Canada.

Cyrus Wellington.

BALSAM LAKE, Wis., June 4.—Cyrus Wellington died here today from locomotor ataxia, aged 66. He was for twelve years chief counsel for the Great Northern and later chief private counsel for James J. Hill. Mr. Wellington retired eight years ago.

John H. Gregg.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., June 4.—John H. Gregg, a prominent citizen, dropped dead this afternoon, following a game of golf at the Country club. Mr. Gregg was apparently in good health when he began the game. He was about 55 years of age.

Rev. Henry J. Bruce.

BOSTON, June 4.—News of the death of Rev. Henry J. Bruce at Panchgani, India, May 4, reached here today. For forty-seven years Mr. Bruce had been one of the American board's missionaries in India. He was 74 years old.

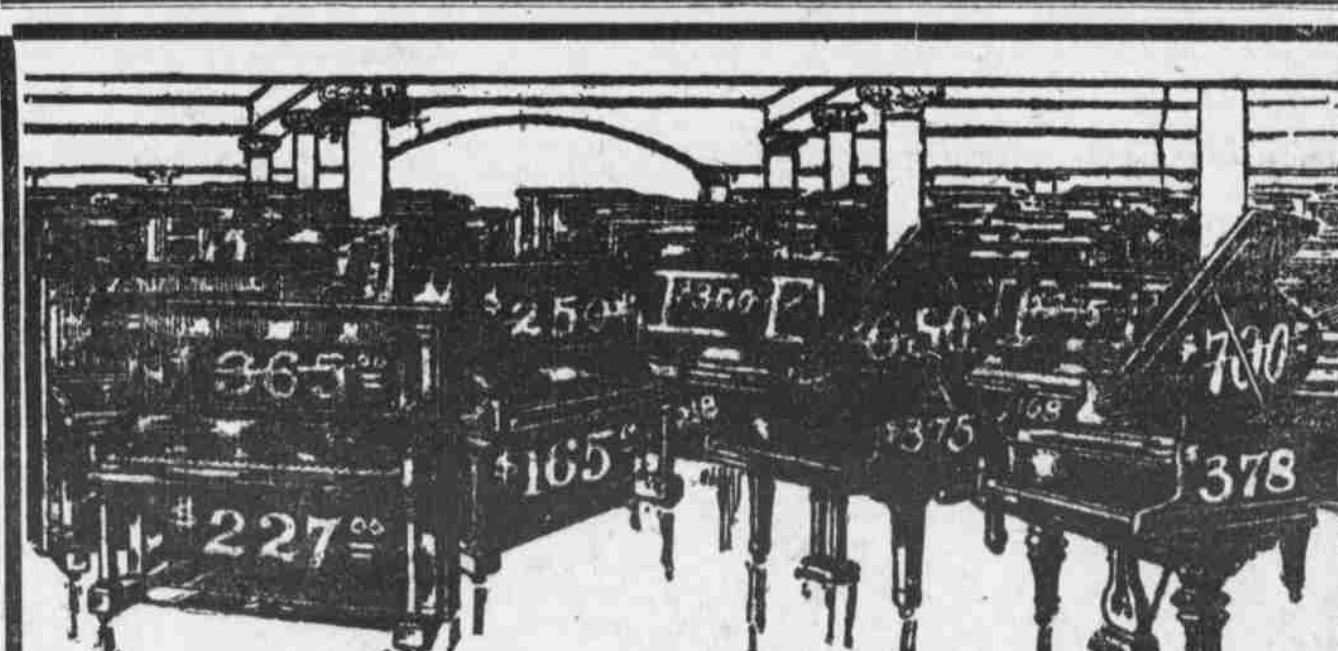
