Keeline's Auto is Recovered—Arthur R. Keeline's roadster automobile, which was stolen from in front of the Racquet club Wednesday night, has been found. The police located it Thursday night. Mrs. Bradley of 3814 Charles street first reporting that a machine was stuck in the mud at Forty-second and Ames avenue. The car proved to be Keeline's and was found to be in good shape, except for the mud on it.  
First Ten-Pound Boy—Dave W. Dickenson, secretary to United States District Attorney Goss, was heard humming lullabies and observed looking over Hilltopian clothing catalogues Friday morning and at the same time benignly remarking to all callers. "The cigars are in the upper drawer; take one or the whole box. Been married seven years, and it's the first ten-pound boy."  
"Snitch" Freese's Wife Gets Divorce—Two more men varied ordinary divorce court proceedings Friday by getting decrees from their wives. Samuel Ross divorced Louise Ross and J. Claude Smith secured a divorce from Ann M. Smith. Mistreated wives were not absent from the list, however. Cora Freese getting a decree cleaving her from Hugo T. Freese, otherwise "Snitch" the ball player, and Eva A. Hayden one from Charles T. Hayden. A petition for divorce was filed by Mrs. Rosetta Albee from George Albee. They were married in Council Bluffs in 1874. Description is alleged.  
Inspection of All Dairy Cows—Federal, state and city authorities will Saturday begin the work of inspection of all cows belonging to dairies that furnish milk to Omaha consumers and they will not stop until every cow has been inspected and all those found to be infected with tuberculosis or other diseases which can be transmitted through the milk have been slaugh-

tered. Dr. H. E. Smith, government veterinarian, arrived in the city Friday and during the day held a conference with Dr. Paul Juckness, state veterinarian; Dr. R. W. Conneli, city commissioner of health, and Dr. C. C. Hall, city veterinarian. The work was mapped out and the officials representing the three authorities will work in conjunction and in harmony.  
Joslyn Case Wide Reaching, Says Judge  
Suit, if Successful, Would Deprive Millionaire of Most Costly Residence in Omaha.  
"The Joslyn case is possibly the most important from a legal standpoint which I have been called upon to decide since I have sat upon the bench," said Judge Troup of the district court yesterday. He had just heard the conclusion of argument in the suit, which, if the plaintiffs are successful, will take from George Joslyn his "3,000,000 castle."  
General J. C. Cowin, who appeared for Joslyn, delivered the last argument in the suit before Judge Troup, basing his contention upon points involved in the "rule in Shelley's case," familiar to every student of law and the source of more grief and ill-feeling in court rooms than any other three rules of law ever laid down. Judge Troup will study the case for some time before giving a decision. The case has heard is based upon one of two identical petitions filed by the grandchildren of Mrs. Emily M. Sutphen, the other being before Judge Estelle and not yet reached.

Private Sewer of Union Stock Yards Caves In.  
WEEK MANHOLE THE CAUSE  
Fourteen Thousand Hogs and Record Price Exerts an Electrifying Effect in Commission Circles.  
The Union Stock Yards sewer caved in Wednesday afternoon at a deep manhole near Seventeenth and Jefferson streets. After this caving the sewer clogged and made a head, breaking again at Railroad avenue and Jefferson street, under Broadwell & Rich's spur track. The fortunate thing about the break was that the sewer could be diverted down the open creek instead of spreading over the surrounding territory. This is the private sewer of the Union Stock Yards company and is not used by the city in any way. The cause of the accident was in the faulty construction of the deep manhole. The lower part of this manhole had been timbered up and at the top a structure of brick was set. The timbers, in the course of years, rotted out and finally gave way under the weight of the brick and mortar. The debris falling to the bottom of the manhole crushed its way into the sewer and stopped it up entirely. The accident was not thought due in any manner to the recent heavy rains. The company has a gang of men at work repairing the break and the work will be completed in a few days.  
Big Stir in Hogs.  
Fourteen thousand hogs on the market and the record price of the year had a most electrifying effect on the South Omaha commission men yesterday. Four lots of about seventy-five each sold at the astonishing figure of \$7.50 per 100 pounds, live weight. This is surely a record price, and yet the commission men are hinting at a probable figure of \$8 per 100 pounds before the close of June. June markets are

usually the highest of the year. During the month of May the receipts were considerable short of the previous year, but the number received is again slowly increasing with each good market day. The decrease for the year are yet much under the 100,000 figure. This is not counted an alarming state of the record, since 1908 was the greatest year in the history of the yards for hog receipts.  
Austrian Loses a Leg.  
Nick Zuklich, Thirtieth and R streets, fell down an elevator shaft in the beef loading department of the Cudahy packing plant yesterday afternoon and so injured his leg that amputation was necessary. He is an Austrian laborer, and while hurrying about his work on the loading floor failed to note the open elevator shaft into which he fell headlong. He went down several floors and the fall on the floor of the elevator pit crushed the leg below the knee. He was taken to the South Omaha hospital, where Dr. E. De Lanney attended him. After the amputation his condition was pronounced comfortable as possible under the circumstances. The accident occurred about 4 p. m.  
Golfers on Tiptoe.  
The management of the South Omaha Country club is straining every nerve to get the golf course in shape for the game between the South Omaha team and the Hagg Hollow club. It is understood that twenty or more players will be on hand. Golf Manager Sherwood expects to have the lineup this evening. The field men at the club have carefully dressed the shaved greens with a coat of sand and oil. They are carefully leveled. Two new grass greens are now in use. It is expected that three or four more grass greens will be ready for use by the middle of the summer. While the shaved greens are well dressed, they are not favored with most golf players, as the slightest grain of sand causes a deflection of the ball.  
The club's base ball team will play against the soldiers from Fort Crook Saturday afternoon. Both teams are said to be in the finest condition.  
The city hall team of South Omaha will play the Cliffswellers, or the team from the Douglas county court house. This game will be called at 2 p. m., to be out of the way by 3:45 p. m.  
Several of the preliminary matches of the early season tennis tournament have been played off. The rest will follow as fast as the players can arrange their dates.  
Held as Fugitive.  
Believed to have broken jail at Okaloosa, Mo., while a prisoner there on the charge of horse stealing, Bird B. Bidler was arrested Friday and is held as a fugitive from justice. Detective P. H. Shields made the arrest at the Omaha Packing plant, where Bidler had been employed as a ham inspector. The man's wife lives in South Omaha. Word of Bidler's arrest has been sent to the sheriff at Okaloosa.

Van Wagonen, the former city fireman who was arrested with a stolen bicycle in Omaha at midnight Wednesday and is being held by the police, who suspect him of having committed several burglaries lately.

## LUNA IN ECLIPSE, EARTH GETTING SQUARELY IN WAY

Moon Shot Off from Light of Sun for Over an Hour Last Night.  
Dozens of Luna—if there are any—had an hour of darkness last night, for that planet known as the earth butted squarely—or roundly—in between the moon and the sun.  
The moon entered the shadow of the earth at 8:42 p. m. and became totally eclipsed at 8:58 p. m. It remained entirely in the shadow until 9:00 p. m. and wholly emerged at 9:14.  
The total eclipse was visible in Omaha for about 12 minutes only, and was not distinctly visible because the moon had completely emerged from the shadow before the end of the twilight. It was visible in Chicago for about half an hour and in New York for nearly an hour, but west of Omaha was almost invisible.  
A large number of people went to the Creighton university observatory to view the sight, and Director Riggs explained to them details of the event.  
This is the first of four eclipses which will take place during 1909, and all of them but one, a solar eclipse, will be visible in the United States to a slight degree at least. The next eclipse will be a solar, the only one visible in the United States this year, on June 17. It will start in Omaha at 6:10 p. m. and will last for about two hours. This eclipse will be visible over the entire United States with the exception of the extreme southwest.
