Army Gossip

Matters of Interest On and Back of the Firing Line Gleaned from the Army and Navy Register.

The retirement of Lieutenant General Arthur MacArthur, U. S. A., is an event worthy of special mention.

Unusual interest appears to attach to the examination which will be held July 12 of candidates for appointment as first lieutenant in the medical corps of the army.

A gratifying response from adjutants general of the various states has been made to the proposition to establish three army medical camps of instruction this summer at Antietam, Sparta, Wis., and near San Francisco, respectively.

It will not surprise the War department officials if Mr. Charles Herring, who is under contract to deliver a flying machine during the present month at Fort Meyer, is to be relieved of this obligation.

The New York Sun's Washington letter, referring to the orders issued by the secretary of war, instructing the chief signal officer of the army to prepare for future a comprehensive plan for the protection of the entire Atlantic coast by dirigible balloons.

It is not the present intention to use airships as a fighting craft and the plans do not contemplate the development of strategic tactics for conflict.

The type of balloon to be used for coast defense has not been decided upon, but it will be of the most approved pattern, probably modeled after the best European dirigibles.

In the course of time plans will be drawn for the defense of all of this country's coast line, but the beginning of the work will be on the Atlantic coast.
