TAFT AGAINST INCOME TA& Be Offered to Country-Brown's

WASHINGTON, June 18 -- When the income iax question comes before the senale for a vote next Friday, the plan of its opponents, backed by the influence of President Taft, to circumvent the adoption of such a measure, will be fully outlined: Already the opponents express confidence in their abality to substitute for the income tax amendment a provision for a tax on net earnings of corporations, available for dividend purposes, coupled with a provision for the supmission to the legislatures
