INCANDESCENTS FOR ARCS

Substitution in Street Lights Considered by City Council.

Johnson Believes Small Bulbs Would Give People in Residence Distriots Better Satisfaction Than the Big Lights.

CAN THUS COVER MORE SPACE

Incandescent instead of arc lamps may be used to light the residence districts of Omaha after the current year. Members of the new city council are considering making the change in the interest, largely, of people living in the newly settled additions and in outlying districts. Should the change be made it will be for the reason that more territory can be covered with incandescent than with are lamps, and that dark intersections and other places where light is needed can be lighted which lack of funds has prohibited.

The present five-year contract with the Omaha Electric Light and Power company expires at the close of the current year and before a contract, is entered into between the city and the company the proposed change will be thoroughly discussed.

The city is now paying for 1,000 arc lamps on the streets of Omaha. Over 960 of these are in the residence districts. Three and one-half times as much current is used by an arc lamp as is used by an incandescent, and therefore 3.325 incandescents could be installed for the same amount of current and at the same cost as the 950 ares used in the residence districts. Under the present system less than 1,000 intersections are being lighted in the residence districts, but If the change in the lighting system should be made over 3.000 intersections could be lighted without increased cost to the city, it is argued.

Arc lamps naturally give more light than incandescents, but Councilman Johnson believes the people would be better satisfied with incandescents.

"I have not looked into the matter very closely," said Mr. Johnson, "but if we could get a contract for either ares or incandescents, we could put it up to the residents of a certain locality and tell them they could either have ten arc lamps, for instance, or thirty-five incandescents. They could do just as they pleased about it, but I think most localities would choose the incandescents on account of the greater number and the larger territory that would be covered.

Man Who Leaves Home is Found Dead at Gibson

Jacob Havel is Discovered in Weed Patch Near the Burlington Railroad Station.

Jacob Havel, 26 years of age, who lived with his widowed mother, Mrs. Jennie Havel, at First and Spring streets, Gibson, and who disappeared in an angry mood last Sunday morning and could not be located, was found dead Friday noon lying in a large patch of weeds near the Burlington station at Gibson or at least that the report received by Frank Radi South Omaha sanitary officer. Radil is a

cousin. Despondency and suicide, robbery and murder, or sudden death from sickness, are theories offered to account for Havel being found dead.

He attended a party Saturday night and is said to have returned home intoxicated the next morning about 7:30 o'clock. His mother remarked about his condition and his being out so late.

Havel went to bed, but got up again about 10 o'clock in the morning and left home without saying a word as to his intentions. Since that time, until his body was discovered, nobody is known to have seen him.

The police were furnished with descriptions of the missing man as early as Tuesday and Sergeant Tony Vanous was appealed to personally Thursday evening at his home by the anxious mother. He made a thorough investigation of the case Friday morning at Gibson, but reported to the police station that the man had not been found.

Havel's hat was found at Gibson a day or two ago by a rallway employe-Gus Miller-and it is said that a postal card was reecived at Gibson, signed by Havel and dated at Kansas City. In it he said he was "O. K." and asked how the Gibson

Havel was working in Livesey & Co.'s brick yard when he disappeared. He is a brother-in-law of Frank Radil, the South Omaha sanitary officer, who received the only news of the finding of the body and immediately went with a buggy to investigate the report.

He was about six feet in height, weighed 180 pounds and had a smooth face and light brown hair, cut short in the back.


