SARGENT IS GOLF CHAMPION

He Wins at Englewood and Surprises Everybody.

THOMAS M'NAMARA IS SECOND

Winner of Championship of United States is Really a Canadian Player, Temporarily Residing in Vermont.

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., June 25.—George Sargent, entered from the Hyde Manor club, Sudbury, Vt., won the fourth annual open golf championship of the United States today over the Englewood club's links by four strokes. His medal play total at seventy-two holes being 296. The outcome could not have been more surprising. Sargent, a year ago, was unable to qualify for the second day's play in the same event. Sargent is an Englishman, who began as a caddy abroad, and has lived in Ottawa, Canada, for several years, but this summer is in charge of a hotel course over the Vermont link, which is not listed in any of the guides. As he is counted with Dominion players, the feeling is that the title has really gone to Canada. He played a superlatively consistent game throughout. In order he made 75, 74, 73 and 72. His total of 296, three or four strokes lower than the most sanguine forecasters predicted early in the week, and in view of the unprecedented heat and uncertain putting greens, it was remarkable. Second place went to Thomas McNamara of Boston, who also began as a caddy, while other title holders moved up sufficiently on the last round to take third and divide fourth money. Walter J. Travis, former international title holder, was the only amateur to share in the purse, which, of course, in his case will be changed to plate.
