MOON A PLANET, SAYS SAVANT
Naval Astronomer Upsets Theories of Ages Regarding Satellite.
DRAWN FROM SPACE BY EARTH

Prof. Sec. in Paper, Presents Theory that Moon of Earth and Other Planets Formerly Revolved Around Sun.
SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Announcement was made here by Prof. T. J. J. See, astronomer in charge of the naval observatory at Mare Island, that he has mathematically proved a discovery that the moon is a planet captured by the earth from space and not a detached globe of our globe.

BEATRICE—Samuel Wright, an old resident of Beatrice who suffered a stroke of apoplexy last week died Thursday at 107 at Camden, N. Y. He came to Beatrice in 1902, where he has since resided.
NEBRASKA CITY—Judge H. D. Travis has been ill for some time and has discharged the jury for the term and will not call another jury until the next term. It may be that there will be no jury in court unless the judge is better by next Monday.

ALMA—Sheriff Carroll got a telegram today from the clerk of the supreme court at Lincoln to arrest Oliver Stevens, who stabbed Ben Coe last spring and was sentenced by the district court last fall to two years in the penitentiary. Stevens was under bonds awaiting the action of the supreme court.
BEATRICE—A decree of divorce was given by Judge Frank Salts, of Beatrice, to Myra K. Hollerbach, wife of Myra K. Hollerbach. They were married in 1902 and have two children. Myra secured her first divorce, but the couple agreed to forget the past and were reconciled. The divorce was granted on a suit for divorce, but later had the case dismissed.

WIFE DEAD, HUSBAND ACCUSED
Jeane Hendricks of Running Water, S. D., Held in Spite of Suicide Verdict.
TYNDALL, S. D., June 26.—As a result of the death of Mrs. Jeane Hendricks at Running Water on Sunday May 30, the husband will be tried upon the charge of murder. It is alleged by those behind the prosecution that evidence will be produced showing that there was a struggle in the room where the dead body of the woman was found, and the position and course of the bullet wound will have an important place in the testimony.
