South Dakota Banks Ignore Guaranty Law South Dakota Institutions Are Not Placing Themselves Under Provisions of Statute. FERRE, S. D., June 28.—(Special.)—Articles of incorporation have been filed for the Farmers' State bank of Witten, Tripp county, with a capital of \$3,000. The incorporators are A. D. Shepard, Dennis O'Leary, Witten; Chester Slaughter, Dallas. The last half of the June has seen a rush of the \$3,000 banks at the smaller towns over the state, as no banks can be organized in the state after the first of July, with less than \$10,000 in capital. This new law may reduce the number of banks in the smaller towns, but there is no probability of the banking business languishing in the state with its present financial conditions.

Nebraska Lightning Strikes House. MADISON, Neb., June 28.—(Special.)—The residence of J. M. Murphy, wine merchant of this city, was struck by lightning today and Mrs. Murphy was knocked over and rendered unconscious for some time by the shock. Fortunately the roof was thoroughly soaked and the bolt followed a large brick chimney into the cellar and little damage was done other than destroying the upper portion of the chimney and tearing off a portion of the roof. South Dakota COLLISION ON CROSSING. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., June 28.—(Special Telegram.)—Albert Rose of Estherville, Ia., a brakeman in the employ of the Rock Island company, was seriously injured as the result of a collision here late this afternoon between freight trains on the Rock Island and Great Northern roads. As the freight was approaching the local yards and crossing the Great Northern tracks, a train on the latter road backed up, striking the car directly ahead of the caboose on the Rock Island train. The caboose and the car ahead of it were derailed, the caboose being thrown upon its side. Rose was in the caboose and was the only person injured, his shoulder being badly wrenched.

South Dakota DEFENDANT IS LAST WITNESS Denies He Told Finley Cleveland Had Signed First Typewritten Document—Second Photographer Not Present. NEW YORK, June 28.—Attorneys for Broughton Brandenburg, charged with grand larceny, in connection with the alleged spurious letter of Grover Cleveland, placed their final witnesses on the stand and closed the case for the defense. George E. Fleming, lawyer, said he had seen the article with defendant's signature attached, on June 4, 1908. A stenographer, for the prosecution, had previously testified to typing the article June 10, 1908. Mr. Fleming, Sunday editor of the New York Herald, testified he had the signed article in his possession before August 18. On cross-examination Mr. Lewis stated that the article he had was a ribbon, not a carbon copy. Brandenburg had testified that Mr. Cleveland signed a carbon copy. In rebuttal, the prosecution called Charles R. Miller, editor of the Times, who declared that Mr. Cleveland's signature in evidence, was the one attached to the article when it was received by the Times. It had been claimed by the defense that the signature before the court, which had been pronounced a forgery, was not the one originally attached to the Times article.
