ASSESSMENT OF TERMINALS

Board Finishes Its Work on Property of Union Pacific.

FEW MATERIAL CHANGES MADE

Omaka Gains \$30,000 and Beatrice \$3,000-Other Gains or Losses Are Numbered in Hundreds.

(Prom a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN. Neb., June 28 - (Special )-The comparison of the assessment of terminal property of railroads, exclusive of the franchise, as made by the state board of 190s and by the assessors in 1909 on the Union Pacific shows very few material changes. Omaha gains some \$29,000 and Beatrice gains \$3,000. In other towns the gain or the loss is measured in hundreds, in few cases the difference being as much as \$1,000. The state board will equalize these reports of the assessors and then add the value of the rolling stock and the franchies. Following is a comparison of the Union Pacific physical value in cities and towns made by the assessors and the board

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
