Boy Gives Life for One Ride in Freight Elevator

Loyal Jensen is Warned by Father to Keep Away from It, but Fails to Obey.
Loyal Jensen, 11 years of age, son of James P. Jensen, 922 South Twenty-sixth street, died at 1:30 Tuesday morning of injuries sustained in an accident on the freight elevator of the firm of Brinn & Jensen.

The father had repeatedly cautioned the boy to keep away from the elevator, but he was unable to resist the temptation and his first ride was his last. He died at the Omaha General hospital.

The next scene of him was on the second floor by Miss Maud Williams, who discovered he had come up in the elevator. She cautioned him to keep out of it and then forgot about the child until she heard a scream that pierced every corner of the four-story building.

Moore went running to the third story, where the boy was found fastened between the floor of the car and the edge of the floor of the third story. He was unconscious, with his feet and legs in the elevator, the small of his back squeezed between the car and the floor and the rest of his body and his head and arms hanging down.

The boy was extricated from his position by Moore, who carried him to the main floor. The police auto ambulance carried him to the hospital, where Dr. Condon and Police Surgeon Newell cared for him.

He revived on the way. His father and mother were anxious waiters at the hospital while the physicians kept up a number of operations to save his life.

Company to Take Over Independent 'Phone Property
Nebraska Securities is the Name and it is Incorporated for Three-Fourths Million.

The Nebraska Securities company, a corporation to take over the Independent Telephone company, filed articles of incorporation Tuesday. The new company is to have a capital stock of \$750,000, which the articles say shall be paid up on issuance.

The new articles are signed by Walter Grover, George E. Shoemaker, F. M. Phipps, Charles P. Flynn and Albert E. Wilson. Mr. Wilson is attorney for Joseph Harris, the Chicagoan who acquired an interest in the Independent telephone company was then one of the principal creditors of the Independent Telephone company.

E. A. Ebersole, general superintendent of the Independent Telephone company, would say nothing other than that: "The Nebraska Securities company has been incorporated, but its relation to the Independent company cannot be discussed because several contracts remain unassigned."

A significant paragraph in the articles for the Nebraska Securities company says that "it may acquire, hold and own the business of any and all properties, stocks and bonds of companies of a similar kind."

Some of the names appearing among the incorporators are there to make the legal number rather than to represent prospective stockholders.

RATHER HANG THAN PEDDLE

Thus Saying Harry Novick Takes His Life by Strangulation.

SWINGS FROM TROLLEY CAR POLE

Tells Children in Neighborhood He Prefers to Hang Himself Than Continue His Business as a Peddler.

"I would rather hang myself than peddle."
Harry Novick, a Russian Jew peddler, 39 years of age, who boarded at the home of Mrs. Louis Bessell, 1112 Pine street, hanged himself to a street car trolley pole at Eleventh and Locust streets and is dead.

The man was found by John Larson, Fifth and Locust, at 5:30 Tuesday morning. Larson reported the matter to Officer Head, the nearest Omaha policeman, and he reported it to the coroner's office and an assistant hastened out to take charge of the body.

Larson found the man suspended by a leather strap, evidently of a horse's harness. One end was attached to the pole, the other wrapped two or three times around his neck. In his pockets were a 2-caliber revolver, a knife, watch, still running, an empty purse and a letter which proved to be from his father in the old country, written in Russian, inquiring why the family had not heard from him in two months.

Novick had secured the contract for the building, which will cost \$90,000. The plans as drawn by Fisher & Lawrie call for a three-story and basement building built of brick, its horizontal dimensions to be 12x26 feet.

The second story sill courses and all of the trimmings above this point are to be made of ivory-tinted terra cotta. Birch will be used for the interior finish.

Novick will also be begun in a short time on the First Church of Christ, Scientist, at Twenty-fourth street and St. Mary's avenue. The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The contract has been awarded to Gould & Son.

Saloons Object to Free Lunch
Operators Cheer Council Committee When it Recommends for Passage Prohibitive Ordinance.

Nearly 100 saloon keepers occupying seats in the rear of the city council chamber last night when the council committee of the whole yesterday afternoon recommended for passage the ordinance prohibiting free lunches in saloons or rooms adjacent to saloons.

C. E. Fields, representing the saloon keepers, addressed the council at length in opposition to the measure. He said that saloon keepers had in the past made several agreements to do away with the free lunch, but that these agreements had invariably been broken.

The council will meet as a Board of Equalization July 13 and 14, to adjust special assessments of sidewalk taxes. Under the new charter the council meets every month for this purpose.

The council adjourned until 11 a. m. today, when the ordinance covering the paving propositions will be submitted for second reading.

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AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

City Council Recommends Passage of Sanitary Ordinance.

BOND ORDINANCE INTRODUCED

Mayor Kautsky Home from Chicago—Peter Shenda Confesses Attempt to Rob Roskewick's Saloon.

The city council at its meeting last night recommended the passage of the sanitary ordinance and the three ordinances eliminating the five-year clause from three paving bond contracts as requested by Toledo brokers and ordered the city attorney to draft an ordinance eliminating sales and performances by street fakirs.

The sanitary ordinance is a long instrument consisting of ninety sections, covering all the points of sanitation, building and drainage. It is copied carefully after the ordinances of New York, Chicago and Omaha. The aim was to provide for all the conditions of a metropolitan city.

The three ordinances desired by Spitzer & Co., were introduced and will be passed as speedily as possible so as to facilitate the sale of the paving bonds. The new ordinance makes provision for a five-year option for the retirement of these bonds.
