Legal Character of City Savings is Formally Changed by Order of Government.

The City National Bank of Omaha has formally succeeded the City Savings bank. With the receipt of a telegram from the comptroller of the currency Wednesday morning the legal nature of the bank was changed and business was begun as a national bank. The charter number of the

new bank is 9,466. 


